NOVEL AID TO STUDENTS

University of Oregon, Eugene, Sept. 15.—(Special.)—The Y. M. C. A. of the University of Oregon has devised a novel and effective method for assisting new students to find boarding and rooming places. They will erect a large tent near the depot, where headquarters will be established and full information kept in regard to all boarding houses. A large Oregon banner is to be placed above the entrance, and all of the assistants, of whom there will be 12 or 15, will also wear the Oregon colors. They expect all students to make the tent headquarters and to leave suit cases and parcels there until rooms are found. During the four or five days in which students are arriving in greatest numbers, a sufficiently large number of helpers will be on hand to show them the best boarding places. The number of rooms available this year, both for men and women, is much larger than usual.

ASTER SHOW SATURDAY

PLACE SELECTED IS THE K. OF P. LODGE HALL.

Aster Show Will Be Held During Afternoon and Evening—Refreshments, Class Undecided, to Be Served—Committees Want Donations of Asters for Exhibit.

Imperative Notice.
A small bouquet of asters for exhibit and competitive purposes is as urgent as a bushel. Every aster culturist is urgently requested to bring donations to the K. of P. hall before the doors open for the show Saturday afternoon at 2 p. m. The prizes will be awarded to anyone regardless of club affiliation, as the city as a whole is conducting the show.

The annual La Grande aster show will be given in this city next Saturday afternoon and night, and those in charge are the busiest mortals in the city today. Committee meetings are frequent and from time to time new details are worked out that will, when the time comes for the big event, make the affair a huge success.

The show will be held in the Knights of Pythias hall, in the post-office building, and the festivities will hold out for the afternoon and evening. The hours for the doors to open in the afternoon is 2 o'clock, and from that hour until 5 the show will be conducted in all its glory. For a period of two hours the doors will be closed, and then at 7 o'clock until 10 o'clock the evening performance will be given. At each period, music of some description will entertain the crowds.

Refreshments to Be Served.
Refreshments will be served during the afternoon and evening. The condition of the weather will determine the nature of the refreshments. If warm, ice cream will be the rage; while hot drinks will supplant the cooling dish if the weather is inclined to be cold and disagreeable.

Liberal Prizes Offered.
The committees in charge have decided to offer liberal prizes and this alone should be an incentive for much competition. For the best display of asters, the prize is \$5. The same prize is up for the best and largest collection; \$5 for the best aster of any one color; \$1 for the best bouquet, and \$1 for the best specimen.

It is very likely that still other prizes will be posted before the day of the show.
Asters from every yard is necessary to make this exhibit complete. The management of this annual event can not spell success unless the citizens who have asters, be they ever so diminutive in quantity, come willingly to the committee with the exhibits.
