One could hardly tire of viewing the splendid film at the Sherwood theater, "Father to Blame." Though this film is a stellar attraction, it is not alone in eliciting praise. Comedy is wrapped up in the "Unsuccessful Flirt," and those who have not seen this film are missing something. Tonight is the last opportunity to see the present film.

The Scenic's Change.
Tonight the Scenic puts on "From White House to Navy Building," as its headliner, and there is good reason for it. The film is up-to-date and pictures clearly Judge Taft, the presidential candidate, and C. H. P. Bell, as both are enjoying a gallop to Fort Morgan. It also pictures Mrs. William Taft and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Taft in the reviewing stand. The film is one that appeals at this time especially. Whitman Opens Tonight.
Whitman college will be formally opened tonight, when the convocation exercises are held in the Memorial hall. The largest membership ever enrolled in the institution occurs this year, and it is thought that there will be over 100 students in the freshman class alone. The four dormitories are practically filled at present, and there is still a large number of students to arrive, says a Walla Walla paper.

Many arrived on today's trains, but about the same number are expected tomorrow. Members of the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. meet the new students at the trains, and they had their hands full this afternoon to receive the many new scholars.

Sterling, concert pianist, who has been employed as an instructor in Whitman Conservatory, will make his first appearance before a Walla Walla audience tomorrow evening.

Shortage of Labor.
Contrary to general expectations there is reported to be a heavy shortage of labor in the inland empire. During the past few months, or in fact, since the financial flurry of last fall, there has been more laborers than work, but this condition is becoming rapidly alleviated, and as the large industrial institutions are once again getting on their feet, there is a heavy demand for laborers. The most noticeable companies that have been reporting large shortages are the construction crews which several railroads have been working in this part of the state.

Pendleton Cases Postponed.
Pendleton, Sept. 14.—The 12 men arrested Saturday night charged with "bootlegging," were arraigned this morning, but were postponed until later in the week. District Attorney Phelps stated that he had plenty of evidence against these under arrest, and others who would be brought before the grand jury.
