HAVE FOUND NEW SYSTEM

Walla Walla, Sept. 16.—The Union says:

Announcement was made in this city yesterday that the Northern Pacific railway system is soon to inaugurate an entirely new method of train dispatching, which is calculated to materially lessen detail work of dispatches and minimize accidents.

The new system is known as the "A B C" system, probably so named because of its simplicity. It is an elaboration of the block system. Trains are obliged to get orders at every station and are not allowed to proceed until the order is delivered.

The "A B C" system increases the efficiency of the road, enables the operation of a maximum number of trains, with the least delay, reduces the work of the train dispatcher, and, in connection with the block signal system, makes collisions as near impossible as any means human skill can devise.

Given Year's Trial

The new system is known as the Northern Pacific between Ritzville and Spokane for about a year. It has been given a thorough test and has been found to be adequate in every emergency.

In brief, the system is this: A train leaving Tacoma for instance, receives orders as far as Puyallup. At Puyallup the train gets an order to Meeker Junction, at the Junction there is another order for Sumner, and so on. If the track is not clear the train gets no order and it is obliged to wait until it is. At stations where there is not a regular stop the order is delivered by means of a loop which can be caught on the arm of the conductor or engineer as the train passes.

Under the old system a train would leave a station with perhaps a dozen or more orders for meets with other trains at different points. If anything happens to any of the trains so that the schedule was broken, the entire lot of orders would have to be changed.

Adopted by Other Roads.

A party of Harriman officials recently made a trip over the Northern Pacific from Ritzville to Spokane to inspect the system. They were so satisfactorily impressed that a recommendation was made for its adoption by the entire Harriman system.

The National Association of Train Dispatchers has also endorsed the "A B C" system and recommends its adoption by the railroads.

TO DECIDE CHAMPIONS

As soon as the weather clears and the courts are once more in condition, a tennis championship series will be instituted, which will in the end stamp championship honors on three or four classes of players in the Algonquin Tennis club. A schedule of preliminaries, semi-finals and finals in mixed doubles, men's doubles, ladies' doubles and men and ladies' singles, is now being prepared and as soon as the weather is favorable, the series will start. Much interest was exhibited by the members in the summer sport prior to the present rainy season, and when things are less "H-2-O" some interesting matches will be held.

Why People Like It.

The primary election system is growing in favor because the people wish to rule through their servants and not to be ruled by bosses. In Oregon the old convention system is dead though politicians of the old school are doing all they can to discredit the new law. The people have regained their political prerogatives and they mean to cling to them. In Washington the primary law has brought many candidates before the voters—good men who would not have entered the political arena under the old convention system.—Condon Globe.
