## ACADEMY IS NOW OPEN

With a substantial increase over the  
opening attendance last year the  
doors of the Pendleton academy swung  
open Monday and work in that school  
is now under way, says a Pendleton  
paper. For the opening the enroll-  
ment records show that 15 more stu-  
dents matriculated than upon the  
opening day a year ago.

Because of the good attendance and  
general bright prospect for the school,  
President Bleakney and other mem-  
bers of the faculty are well pleased.  
Kooz hall is now entirely filled, and  
Brown Hall, the boys' dormitory, is  
filling up more rapidly than was ex-  
pected. Last year the total attendance  
at the academy was 107 and if pres-  
ent prospects continue this figure will  
be easily passed this year.

At the Presbyterian church Mon-  
day evening the annual convocation  
address was delivered the academy  
students by Rev. S. W. Seemann, of  
La Grande. It was an inspiring ad-  
dress.

## BARD LEAVES WALLA WALLA

Walla Walla, Sept. 16.—Rev. An-  
dreas Bard, for 10 years rector of St.  
Paul's Episcopal church in this city,  
filed his resignation with the vestry  
last night, the date of its taking ef-  
fect being October 1, if possible, and  
not later than October 15.

Reasons given in the resignation  
are that he has been in Walla Walla  
10 years, that he has built the church  
and school here, and that his work is  
completed, and that he desires to go  
to a larger field.

Rev. Andreas Bard, with his wife  
and daughter, will first go to Ger-  
many and will stop for a while at  
Schwerin, Germany, where Mr. Bard's  
father, the Rt. Rev. Paul Bard, bishop  
of northern Germany, is now station-  
ed. Later he will attend Heidelberg  
university to take a course of lectures,  
and in the spring Rev. Bard will re-  
turn to America, locating either in  
New York City or San Francisco, in  
both of which cities he has been offer-  
ed churches. When he is settled  
his family will join him.

## CHANGE IN SCHOOL LAWS

Pendleton, Sept. 17.—The East Ore-  
gonian says:

Radical changes in the present  
school laws of the state are desired  
by the county superintendents and at  
the meeting just held at Salem their  
ideas were freely discussed. At the  
coming session of the legislature an  
effort will be made to have at least  
some of the new ideas enacted into  
law.

The most radical thing proposed at  
the meeting, according to Superin-  
tendent Frank K. Welles, who came  
home last evening, is a plan whereby  
the county is made the unit for all  
the districts contained therein. Under  
this plan the county superintendent  
is to be elected by a school board on  
the same plan a city superintendent  
now serves and all the county  
school affairs are to be directed from  
one general head. Such a plan would  
make the county superintendent a  
school man instead of an office man.

However, this idea will not be pre-  
sented to the legislature this year as  
the superintendents believe that the  
people are not yet ready for the change.
