Other Mail for Dawson to Be Held in Seattle.

No class of mail other than first or second with a single wrap will be forwarded to Dawson, Yukon and Tanana river points until the opening of navigation next June. Other classes of mail destined for such points will be held in the Seattle postoffice during the fall and winter months. The last boat will leave for Nome September 20, after which mail will be forwarded via Valdez under the same conditions as apply to Tanana and Yukon points.

SCHOOL GIRL HAS ELOPED

Chesterfield, Sept. 17.—The police are following out a theory that Miss Esther Hilbert, mysteriously missing since Sunday, is on a transcontinental elopement with Philip Bradley, a former schoolmate, whose home is now at North Yakima, Wash., where the police have been asked to look for the couple.

The girl was a student at Smith college, and it is believed Bradley arranged to meet the girl at the college Sunday. At first friends of the missing girl feared she was foully dealt with. Now they are convinced she eloped. Bradley left here two months ago to enter the fruit-raising business at Yakima.

Roosevelt Holds Public Reception.
Oyster Bay, Sept. 17.—President Roosevelt and his wife, received their neighbors at a public reception at Sagamore. The whole town turned out to greet the president, the poor being as welcome as the rich. At least a thousand gathered in the mansion and on the lawn. The president and his wife moved about in the crowd shaking hands.

Servian to Hang.
Seattle, Sept. 17.—Unless the case is remanded for a new trial by the supreme court, or a stay in proceedings granted, Nick Petrich, a Servian, accused of the murder of Marshal Harry Miller in April, will be sentenced to hang, according to the verdict of the jury rendered yesterday.

Students May Walk Out.
San Jose, Cal., Sept. 17.—Through a feeling of the students of the University of the Pacific against the proposed action of the board of trustees in replying to acting President M. S. Cross by Dr. W. W. Guth of Cambridge, Mass., a walkout of many of the older students is threatened today if the Methodist conference at Pacific Grove, which controls the college, votes to make the changes. Cross was given the temporary presidency two years ago, and his success in the up-building of the institution won the friendship of the students.

Killed in Collision.
Chicago, Sept. 17.—Two were killed, two are dying and many seriously injured in two collisions on the elevated roads in Chicago, due to fog today.

M'DOWELL IS FINED \$250

Mike McDowell of Summerville, was given sentence this afternoon just about 4 o'clock on his own plea of guilty that he had been instrumental in getting two boys of the land office lye intoxicated. McDowell was arrested and pleaded guilty. He was the man who brought Rodney into the limelight, having received the liquor from Rodney and given it to the boys according to his own plea.

Though he was arrested two days ago, his sentence has been hanging fire until this afternoon, when at 4 o'clock he was brought before the justice of the peace and was fined \$250. Justice Stewart, in passing sentence, took into consideration the fact that McDowell, in a measure turned state's evidence, in securing the conviction of Rodney, but had this not been the case, he would have given McDowell the limit, which would have meant a fine of \$500 and a jail sentence of 30 days. There was no excuse whatever in giving those two young boys liquor and the justice gave McDowell a lecture in addition to his fine that will be beneficial to him the remainder of his life if he heeds the advice.
