## GRIDIRON SEASON ON

New York, Sept. 18.—With the first important game, that between the Carlisle Indians and Albright colleges, scheduled for tomorrow, the 1908 football season in the east will be formally opened. According to reports, the redskin eleven is this year unusually strong and will likely make a good showing.  
Not until a week from tomorrow, September 26, will any of the other big college elevens be seen on the gridiron. On that date, Pennsylvania will play its first game of the season at Philadelphia, with West Virginia as its opponent. Brown will play New Hampshire and Syracuse will meet Hamilton.  
Wednesday, September 30, will be the big football inaugural day. Yale will get into the game by playing Wesleyan at New Haven, Harvard will have its initial game at Cambridge, with Bowdoin, and Dartmouth will play Vermont at Hanover.  
Princeton, Cornell, West Point and Annapolis will play their first games on Saturday, October 3, and from that date until November 28, when the season ends with the annual struggle between the elevens of the army and navy academies, every Saturday and Wednesday will be marked by important contests between the football gladiators.  
From present appearances, Yale has the best chances of carrying off the premier, football honors of the

country. Harvard looks weak, and neither Princeton, Cornell, West Point, Annapolis or Pennsylvania can produce elevens, that according to the dope of the wise ones, will be able to take the measure of the strong team of Old Eli.

## GRIEVED AT ACCIDENT

Washington, D. C., Sept. 18.—Orville Wright was injured yesterday when his aeroplane collapsed, killing Lieutenant Thomas Selfridge of the signal corps. He is reported resting well today, the most serious injury being to his right side. Several ribs were also fractured. Experts declared today the accident could have been averted.  
Wright had gone 75 feet in the air when the propeller broke, plunging the aeroplane. Selfridge and Wright to the ground in the presence of 2000 spectators.

Wright is too distressed over the death of Selfridge to make plans, though he has not lost faith in his machine. There is no prospect of the breaking of the propeller.  
Wright's Brother Depressed.  
Lemans, France, Sept. 18.—Wilbur Wright locked himself and his aeroplane in the shed today, as he is greatly depressed over the accident to his brother. He has postponed indefinitely the flights which were scheduled. It is feared the great advance in aerial navigation made by the Wrights will be given a great setback in that the confidence of the nations in their machine will be weakened.  
It was Selfridge's greatest ambition to fly with Wright. He had his heart set on it. It was one of the proudest moments of his life when he boarded the machine on what proved to be a fatal ride. Selfridge was born in San Francisco and was 28 years of age.
