CITY SEEKS BOOZE FINES

Pendleton, Sept. 18.—The city of Pendleton will have prohibition laws of its own and will enforce them on its own responsibility if ordinances introduced last night are made into law.

Two ordinances covering the subject have been prepared at the instance of Mayor Murphy and were presented to the council last night. They are now in the hands of the ordinance committee and seemingly both measures will be passed without opposition.

The first ordinance presented is one which prohibits the sale of intoxicating beverages within the city. The language of the ordinance is identical with that of the state law, excepting in one or two unimportant particulars. The penalty for violating the ordinance was left blank and will be filled in by the committee.

Near Beer Ordinance.

The second ordinance proposed is intended to place resorts that sell near beer and other non-intoxicating malt liquors upon a license basis. The amount to be paid for the license is not yet fixed, nor has the penalty for violations yet been agreed upon.

Before a man may secure a license to sell near beer or kindred beverages he must make written application to the council stating where his place is to be located and he must have his application endorsed by at least three reputable citizens. The application must also set forth his former occupation.

Under the terms of the ordinance proprietors of near beer establishments are barred from selling drinks to Indians or minors.

When the ordinances were presented last night Mayor Murphy explained that he was responsible for them and asked their passage in order to make it possible for the police department to properly handle the local situation.

BLUE MOUNTAIN TRAIL HAS BEEN COMPLETED

Walla Walla, Sept. 17.—J. M. Schmitz, supervisor of the Wenshú national forest reserve, reports the completion of the "Looking Glass Trail" in the Blue Mountains, and two rangers' cabins, one at Tollgate ranger station and one on the Umatilla river. The Looking Glass trail extends from the Tollgate to Mottet meadows, through 12 miles of as rough and rugged section of the country as can be imagined. Only those who have attempted to travel this route, before the trail was built, can appreciate the benefit to be derived from the new trail.

To give an idea of the saving it means to rangers and stockmen, who pack thousands of pounds of supplies over this route in a season, it is stated that the time of making the trip with

a pack horse is reduced from 10 or 12 hours to two or two and one-half hours. The labor and supplies expended in cutting this 10 or 12 miles of trail through the dense brush and timber, cost \$500. Those acquainted with the trail say it is money well spent.

The cabin built at the Tollgate ranger station cost about \$475, and the cabin on the Umatilla cost about \$200.

Mr. Schmitz says plans are already laid for other cabins and trails to be built as soon as the rainy season opens, eliminating the danger of forest fires.

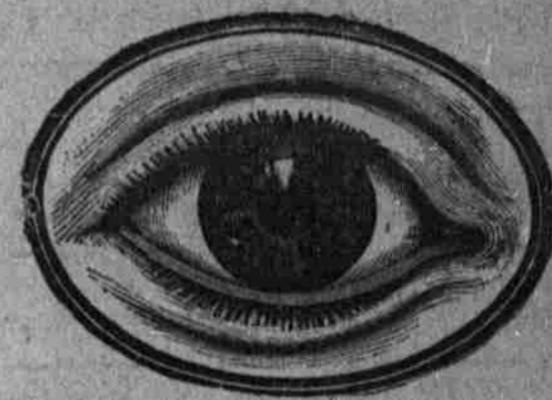
