Removes Second Charge.
Following out this confession, it will be found that it exonerates Holverson of the second offense for which he is charged, and leaves but one case—subject to a fine. The jail sentence which he would inevitably have received if convicted of both charges, has fled, if the confession of Sanford is taken for aught.

On this theory, the \$250 fine imposed by Stewart, but which was later appealed to the circuit court, can be

upheld by the higher court, and not mean a jail sentence. The second charge will be taken care of by a fine, if Sanford's plea is held. Sanford has been bound over to the circuit court.

Sanford's Story.

Sanford tells a story which is plausible and apparently the truth, though its veracity is at this time neither denied nor upheld. He says that he and Hawes were in the Holverson saloon, when Munn came in. Munn is the man who caused Holverson's arrest both times. To Munn Sanford said: "How would you like a drink?" "All right," said the newcomer. "Then give him a drink from my bottle under the bar, there," said Sanford, addressing himself to Hawes, who was behind the counter. This is the crime to which Sanford pleads guilty.

Intimates Perjury.

This plea is a direct lie to the testimony of Hawes who has sworn on the stand that he did not give Munn a drink. No action has been taken on this side issue, and it is not intimated that any will be.

Exonerates Holverson.
The second arrest of Holverson was substantially based on this act, which Sanford pleads guilty to, thus taking the burden upon himself. He cannot consistently be sentenced to jail imprisonment, it being his first known offense.

Complicated in the Extreme.

When circuit court sits, there will be a combination of cases bound up in what is really one, that will keep matters humming for a day or two at least. The outcome of the whole affair is a blank. District Attorney Ivanhoe has a plan of procedure mapped out and will push vigorously the fight until he has the guilty properly punished.

Brewers and liquor dealers realize the gravity of the situation and will do their utmost to prevent the passage of the local option act.

If the special session is harmonious, it will likely aid the Republicans in carrying the state. If a factional fight results, the democrats will have their opportunity, and will not hesitate to take advantage of it. The Republicans will make the local option bill a party measure and seek to whip into line enough votes to make it a law, but doubtless as to the ability of the party leaders to control the assembly. The house, of course, will be the scene of the struggle if there is one. The Republicans have 53 members to 47 democrats. This is a safe margin if caucus action can be taken. But it is recalled that some five or six Republicans refused at the regular session to go into any temperance caucus and it is feared that these may cause trouble.

As the situation is now, Indiana has 75 counties which are wholly without the saloon. The passage of a local option law, the anti-saloon workers believe, will mean at least 30 "dry" counties out of the 92 within two years. The constitutional amendment they rely upon to settle the matter for all time.

Another matter, and the chief object of the special session, will be that of extending the appropriation act of the last general assembly so as to prevent unexpended balances to specific appropriations from reverting at the end of the fiscal year, September 30, to the general fund. As the law now stands, these unexpended balances would revert and consequently hinder the work of constructing several new institutions.

Another consideration will have to do with providing protection against the night riders of southern Indiana. There have been no recent depredations, but the tobacco crop is not yet harvested, so raids are expected. The experience of Kentucky and Ohio has demonstrated that a state militia is unable to cope with masked marauders who ride and burn and murder at unexpected hours in unexpected places, so it is thought desirable that the governor be given wide powers to deal with any situation that may develop.

of by themselves, and the only exit they have is through the high school assembly room. Hence the rule is enforced, that whoever appears in the high school must remain a half hour after school is out in the evening as punishment. This necessarily works a hardship on the students of the eighth grade. There is no recess, and with a severe punishment ready to be inflicted if they leave the room, the students are put to considerable inconvenience. Finally, when the hour for releasing the children comes, the eighth grade and the high school students pile from the second floor, and by careful "herding" the teachers are able to clear the first floor in time to allow dismissal of the grades on the second floor.
