COMPLETE CHARTER PUBLISHED

The Document in Toto Published Today for Benefit of Taxpayers.

In this issue of The Observer appears the complete charter ordinance which will be voted upon at the special election in November. In it the reader will find the salient charter provisions which, if violated, will cause the inconveniences usually settled in the recorder's court, and every citizen of La Grande should know, in a general way, what is in the charter whereby the city is governed.

Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday, the 24th day of November, 1908, a special election will be held of the voters of the City of La Grande, Union county, Oregon; and that the polls will be open from the hour of 9 o'clock a. m., until the hour of five o'clock p. m., of said day. Said election is called by order of the Council of the City of La Grande for the purpose of proposing and submitting to the people of the City of La Grande the approval and adoption of certain amendments to the charter of the city of La Grande as shown by the proposed charter heretofore approved by the council of the City of La Grande by ordinance No. 392, Series 1908, and filed with, and in the office of the recorder of the city of La Grande, on the 10th day of September, 1908.

The approval of these amendments by the people of the city of La Grande will be submitted to the voters on the following proposition:

Shall the City of La Grande amend its charter and approve the amendments to the city charter, and the new city charter proposed and submitted by the council to the people of the city of La Grande?

The following are the polling places, judges and clerks of the several wards designated and appointed by the council:

First Ward, City Hall—Judges: J. P. Clark, E. C. Davis and Frank Kilpatrick. Clerks: William Miller and Arthur Curtis.

Fourth Ward, Harris Hall—Judges: Bernard Logsden, G. E. Fowler and John Sheak. Clerks: C. J. Vanderpool and Warren P. Noble.

are elected and qualified; provided, that all hold-over Councilmen shall continue as such until the expiration of the term for which they were elected, and the terms of office of their successors shall expire on the second day of January, 1912.

Time Charter Goes Into Effect.

Section 87. This Charter, if adopted by the legal voters of the City of La Grande, shall go into effect immediately upon its adoption, and be and continue in full force and effect thereafter, until legally amended or repealed.

Previous Charters Repealed.

Section 88. All Charters of the City of La Grande, and all parts of Charters heretofore existing, are by the adoption of this Charter, hereby repealed.

Section 89. That the Amended Act as contained in the foregoing sections and the amendments to the Charter of the City of La Grande, as therein provided, shall be filed with the Recorder of the City of La Grande, the same being the City Clerk of said City, and not less than sixty days after it has been so filed shall be proposed and submitted to the people of the City of La Grande by the Recorder of said City, for their approval.

Special Election.

Section 90. That a special election is hereby ordered to vote upon the approval and adoption of said amended Charter and the amendment to the Charter of the City of La Grande, as set forth in said amended Charter, and that said election shall be held on the 24th day of November, 1908.

Notice of Election.

Section 91. That the Recorder give notice of said election by posting in at least three public places in each Ward of the City of La Grande a notice of the following form, to-wit:

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Said election is called by order of the Council of the City of La Grande for the purpose of proposing and submitting to the people of the City of La Grande the approval and adoption of certain amendments to the Charter of the City of La Grande as shown by the proposed Charter heretofore approved by the Council of the City of La Grande, by Ordinance No. 392, Series 1908, and filed with and in the office of the Recorder of the City of La Grande, on the 10th day of September, 1908.

The approval of these amendments by the people of the City of La Grande will be submitted to the voters in the following proposition:

"Shall the City of La Grande amend its Charter and approve the amendments to the City Charter and the new City Charter proposed and submitted by the Council to the people of the City of La Grande?"
