## LOCAL OPTION SPREADING

Hon. E. J. Smith of Walla Walla, who was recently elected as republican nominee for the office of prosecuting attorney of Walla Walla, passed through this city yesterday on his way to La Grande, says a Pendleton paper. Mr. Smith said that there was destined to be a bitter fight on in the Garden City over the prohibition question as soon as the local option law passed the legislature.

That the law will pass is practically assured by the fact that both parties have the plank in their platforms and the republican party which is sure to carry the state, nominated a straight local option ticket in the recent primaries.

The question over which a fight will be made in the legislature, according to Mr. Smith, will be over whether the local option law shall make the county or the precinct the unit. If the latter plan carries, which, of course, the saloon forces favor, it will be impossible for Walla Walla to get rid of the saloons as some precincts are dominated entirely by the liquor men.

If, on the other hand, the county is made the unit, Walla Walla county will probably go dry, for Mr. Smith says that although the struggle will be violent, he believes the prohibition element to be the stronger.

In speaking of the recent primaries Mr. Smith said that the official count has made great changes in the results of the senatorial contest. Ankeny is favored clear through by the final counts and the Jones majority has been hewn on every corner. King county went for Ankeny by over 2000 majority. Mr. Smith says that there is nothing in the report that Ankeny may carry the fight into the legislature.

## WHOLESALE ARRESTS

Pendleton, Sept. 24.—The Tribune said yesterday:

Again the trial of the 12 liquor dealers was postponed yesterday and all will be merged in the wholesale prosecutions to be dealt with by the grand jury, which will be shown tomorrow. That there will be "things doing" this coming week is beyond doubt.

District Attorney Phelps announced yesterday for the first time, that a systematic evidence gathering campaign had been carried on in this county for several weeks with the result that sufficient facts have been

collected to warrant the arrest of several hundred men. Over 100 witnesses have been summoned and the whole country will be stirred, so thoroughly has the matter been gone into.

The work of gathering evidence has been carried on by a Thiel detective who has been employed for several weeks. The detective has not been in the employ of the prohibition forces but has been working for Mr. Phelps and he has done his job up well.

It is said that the search reveals the fact that liquor has not only been sold, but that it has been furnished to minors and even to young girls. The future of the arrested parties will be determined soon by the grand jury and Circuit Judge Bean.

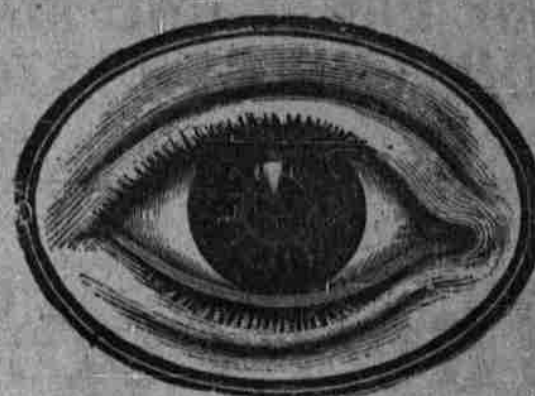
