ST. PAUL'S SCHOOL.

Walla Walla Girls' Educational Institution Has Big Enrollment.

St. Paul's school, Walla Walla, opens the year with a much larger list of students than was made at the same time last year. The departments have been readjusted to meet the demands of Wellesley, Smith, LeLand Stanford for a certificated school, and through carefully defined courses of study are now offered with diploma college preparatory, general course and English and modern language courses. Besides, there are special courses, as the home economics, commercial course, elocution, bookkeeping and a long list of subjects as set forth in the catalog;

any one of which may be pursued in a systematic way, and is accorded a certificate for a certain amount accomplished.

The teachers are eastern women from the larger colleges, acquired by the principal through Wellesley, Michigan university, etc. They have come to maintain a standard which assures the quality of the work.

Special arrangements have been made for the care of young girls of 10 or thereabouts. Careful attention is given to them personally—to their laundry, care of their clothes, etc.

Sewing is taught and there will be classes in dressmaking and millinery, if desired.

TWO CASES ARE DELAYED

District Attorney Ivahhoe was called to North Powder today to prosecute a man by the name of Davis, who is alleged to have unmercifully beaten his wife, and consequently he could not be present at the date hearings set in the justice court. His deputy, Attorney Hodgins, appeared in court this afternoon at 1 o'clock and secured a stay in proceedings until tomorrow, when the cases of Charles Anderson, accused of selling liquor,

and Mr. Lewis, who is accused of breaking into a box car in the local yards, to steal whisky, will be heard and disposed of. The latter case promises to have some heat with it. The O. R. & N. has several witnesses and some sensational developments are expected.

CONTEMPT CASE HEARD

Frank Briggs of Starkey is being tried for contempt of court today. This is his second offense, and the case today is being fought with considerable vim. He has been twice enjoined from using water purported to be the property of H. T. Hill, also of Starkey, who is the complaining witness. Attorney Hodgins appears for the state while Attorneys T. H. Crawford and J. F. Baker are counsel for the defendant. It is expected that the case will be brought to a close tonight, though the court lost an hour after lunch to allow the deputy prosecuting attorney to appear in the justice court, where the docket is somewhat congested. Judge Knowles is hearing the contempt case.

GOOD MEETINGS.

Assistant Head of Anti-Saloon League Preaches in City.

Rev. J. R. Knodell, assistant superintendent of the Oregon Anti-Saloon league, preached in the Central Church of Christ yesterday morning and in the Presbyterian church in the evening. He also addressed a union meeting of the young people in the Methodist church. Mr. Knodell is a very interesting speaker and his audiences were highly pleased. He told of the wonderful transformation taking place in our state, under the local option law. Four maps were displayed. The first, showing the state all black as in 1905, with no "dry" counties. Another showed eight white counties and a number shaded, representing counties dry and partly dry as in 1906. Another showed the state as in 1908, with 21 white counties and all the rest shaded, thus showing that in no county has the saloon all the territory. The last map showed the state all white, as Mr. Knodell says it will be in 1910.

To Improve Upper Mississippi.

Clinton, Iowa, Sept. 21.—To render the upper portion of the Father of Waters a great commercial artery is the purpose of the Upper Mississippi Improvement association, which will open its annual meeting here tomorrow. Delegations are here from many cities and states. The proposed lake-to-the-gulf waterway project is one of the important subjects on the program. The present meeting is considered as of especial importance, in as much as it precedes the national election and the session of congress in December.
