TWO DAYS OF ENTHUSIASTIC LABORS CLOSED LAST NIGHT.

Mrs. Hattie Wolf of Union, Re-elected President—Mrs. Olive Bolton of La Grande, Vice-Superintendents of the Several Departments of the Work Selected—La Grande Delegates Report Most Cordial Reception.

The county convention of the W. C. T. U. which finished its two-days' session in Union last evening, was one of the best attended conventions held for a number of years. The delegates who attended the convention from La Grande returned with enthusiasm and for the year's work and had nothing but words of praise for the royal entertainment that was extended them by their friends in Union.

JOKE ON "DAD" NASH.

Baker Paper Relates Incident About Mr. Nash, Now Deceased.

The Baker City Herald relates the following about a man who at one time lived in La Grande, but later moved to Pendleton, when he was promoted to passenger service from a freight run:

The memory of old Dad Nash, an O. R. & N. conductor, still clings to those employed on the mountain division of that road. It is said the popular old conductor was a great joke-smith and on one trip out of Huntington he had a fresh news butcher on his train who had never had experience in the business. It happened that in those days soda pop was a profitable commodity with much demand on the trains. The news merchant laid in a large stock of soda pop and while he was in another part of the train Dad Nash and the trainmen removed the soda pop and filled them again with water. The boy made his trip through the train calling out "soda pop" and passengers bought freely. All trainmen were anxiously waiting the trouble, but no trouble came. When Dad Nash used to tell the story he would always close by saying, "all these little fancies are only in the mind, those passengers' bought the kid's bottles of water, drank them and were satisfied, while we fellows on the train never did get a chance to laugh." Conductor Nash died a few years afterward from broken heart caused by his nearest and dearest friend being killed by a switch engine.
