A period of 14 years elapses and all in the office of the great Harmagee mills, to satisfy the proprietor's desire for gambling, reduces the wages of the workmen, that he may use what he saves by the reduction to use in his gambling. Once again the burglars are face to face, man and man. A jagged scar extending from the neck half way to the man's waist. The sight takes his mind back to a cave in the mountainside. He lives over the brief struggle and he realizes the enormity of his crime against this man, and he pleads for mercy.
