# ELGIN FAIR ANNOUNCED

Elgin will hold her first annual Fruit, Agricultural and Livestock exhibit Friday and Saturday, October 16 and 17. This is the result of the activities of the Elgin Commercial club.

At a meeting held Wednesday evening it was decided to hold something of the above nature and it will become a permanent affair, known as the Elgin Fruit, Agricultural and Livestock exhibit. The following committee on general arrangements was appointed: F. E. Smith, J. B. Thorson, H. H. Weatherspoon, D. A. Barnes and G. C. Mapes. This committee will have power to appoint all sub-committees and will have general supervision of the event. The finance committee of the recent celebration reported a balance of \$41.90 on hand and this will be used as a nucleus around which to secure other funds for the event. D. A. Barnes and L. A. Stoop were appointed to solicit additional funds and no trouble is anticipated in securing an amount sufficient to carry on the event.

It is not planned to have an elaborate display this year, owing to the short space of time for arrangements, but it is an assured fact that an exhibit of fruits, vegetables, grain and livestock will be brought together that will be a credit to our community. Not only with the farmers be urged to bring in their products but local business men will cover every section of the country and collect suitable exhibits. It is planned to secure the Hallgarth building for a display room and it will make an excellent pavilion. Arrangements will be made to fit the building with suitable stands and shelves and work will commence at an early date.

Another feature of the two days event will be lectures by prominent men along fruit and agricultural lines and it is hoped to make it an event of interest and learning.

An effort will be made to get Jap Chandler and others to take charge of the livestock show and this will be one of the important features of the exhibit. The horse show last spring was such as to insure the success of the present undertaking. Other features will be added and there will be something of interest to all during both days.

Those in charge of the affair will bend every effort towards success and if our farmers, fruitgrowers and livestock men will give their hearty co-operation the first event will be a grand success. Full particulars with prize list will be out soon.—Elgin Recorder.

### Combine Meetings.

Pendleton, Sept. 25.—Announcement was made yesterday by County Superintendent Frank K. Welles, that the annual county institute for teachers would meet this year in Baker City in conjunction with the meeting of the eastern Oregon division of the State Teachers' association on the 23d, 24th and 25th of November.
