DEDICATE SCHOOL MONDAY. Elgin's New Structure to Be Initiated With Formalities.

Elgin's new \$20,000 school building, which will be completed this week, will be dedicated and opened next Monday by public exercises, says the Recorder. The committee recently appointed by the Commercial club has arranged a program of interest and the new building will be opened in a fitting manner. The exercises will be held at 2 p. m. and will consist of addresses, selections by the local orchestra and vocal numbers. County School Superintendent Bragg will be one of the speakers, also T. A. Rinehart. The exercises will be held in the assembly hall and seats will be provided for several hundred.

Those in charge of the exercises hope that every patron of the district will be present. The building will be open during the entire afternoon for inspection and all are urged to take advantage of the opportunity. It will be an occasion of importance to Elgin and no one should fail to attend. The invitation includes every farmer of this section.

SEVENTY-TWO JAPS ARRIVE. Crop Almost Equal to Last Year's Record-Breaker, About to Be Pulled.

Seventy-two Japanese, a portion of the crew of 150 laborers who will harvest the beet crop in this valley, arrived today from Portland, and during the day have been distributed to various sub-farms of the La Grande district. Manager Sebbelov is making haste to commence beet pulling about Tuesday or Wednesday and the arduous task is being hurried on account of the frosts. Not that the slight nippings are injurious, but they retard additional growth. Therefore, as there is no likelihood of more growth, the company will hurry the harvest to completion, if possible, before the rainy season. If the crops are harvested before rains set in, the grand total of beets will be equal to former years, though slightly curtailed compared with last year's record breaker. Favorable weather will allow a complete harvest, hence the early commencement and the large number of laborers to make possible utmost speed when once started.
