Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday, the 24th day of November, 1908, a special election will be held of the voters of the City of La Grande, Union county, Oregon, and that the polls will be open from the hour of 9 o'clock a. m., until the hour of five o'clock p. m., of said day.

Said election is called by order of the Council of the City of La Grande for the purpose of proposing and submitting to the people of the City of La Grande, the approval and adoption of certain amendments to the charter of the city of La Grande as shown by the proposed charter heretofore approved by the council of the City of La Grande by ordinance No. 292, Series 1908, and filed with, and in the office of the recorder of the city of La Grande, on the 10th day of September, 1908.

The approval of these amendments by the people of the city of La Grande will be submitted to the voters on the following proposition:

ASK REPUBLICAN AID.

Democratic National Committee Appeals to Wrong Man.

Baker City, Sept. 25.—Judge W. S. Newbury of Baker City, who lays an undisputed claim to the fact that he has always been a republican, is somewhat irritated over a letter that he received this morning from the democratic national committee. The letter is "purely personal" and puts the judge on the back as a good fellow, tells of the crisis which the nation is facing, and closes with a fervent appeal that the judge get in line, throw off his coat and yell for Bryan. And there is something else mentioned, probably far more important to the committee. It is a suggestion for the judge to busy himself in collecting a little collateral among his friends and send it in to be used in defraying campaign expenses.

Mr. Newbury read every word of the long message, including printed slip sheets, and the more he read the madder he grew. Then he took his pen in hand and addressed a letter to Norman E. Mack. His letter is personal, too, and in it he tells the chairman who Newbury is, how he enlisted in his country's service under the old flag, how he took his republicanism into the civil war and brought in out unscathed and unchanged.

TRANS-MISSISSIPPI CONGRESS.

Some of the Representative Men Who Will Be Present.

San Francisco, Sept. 26.—Among the governors who will be present at the 19th annual session of the Trans-Mississippi Commercial congress, which convenes in San Francisco October 6 to 10, are Hon. J. N. Gillett of California, Hon. Frank Gooding of Idaho, Hon. John C. Cutler of Utah, Hon. W. F. Frear of Hawaii and others.

Governor Cutler will address the congress upon the subject of "The Conservation of Natural Resources." Governor Frear will speak for "Pearl Harbor" and other governors who will be present will participate in the discussions of the various questions in which they are interested. For this occasion there are low rates from all points in the western country to San Francisco, whose chambers of commerce is arranging an elaborate program for the entertainment of the delegates.
