University of Chagon, Edgene, Sept, D. - (Special.) -- The antiersity will issue in a short time the second numbet of its bulletin on Correspondence Study courses. The correspondence Work hat year met with so encouraging a reception and the demand for it was so great that the department has been greatly strengthened and many new courses are being offered. It is believed that 3000 students will enroll for this work between now and the first of January.

Increase of 30 Per Cent. The first two days' registration at the University of Oregon has been the greatest in the history of the institution. Already nearly 475 students have enrolled, which is greater than the total enrollment for the whole of last year. A large number of old students will return within the next two weeks, and the total enrollment for the year will reach 550, or an increase of 30 per cent over last year.

There is a strong sentiment among all who take any interest in high school affairs for McKinney and much influence is being brought to bear on him to accept. He has taken the matter under advisement and the boys guided by him.
