TRYING TRAPP FOR MURDER

Baker City, Oct. 3.—The Herald said last night:

At last the docket in district court has been cleared to the case of the State of Oregon vs. D. R. Trapp, charged with murdering "Slim" Jaspersen at Huntington several weeks ago. This case has been the one around which intense interest has centered this term of court.

Trapp Has Worried Look.

D. R. Trapp, the accused, appeared in court today with more or less of a worried look on his face. He was scrutinized carefully by every spectator, and general anxiety abounds in what line of defense this man will follow. The killing of Jaspersen was done by him, but what cause he may have had for the capital crime is not known to the public, and it is that very thing which people are anxiously waiting to hear. Both men were bartenders in Huntington, apparently they had been friends, rather inclined to be close friends. This has been mentioned by Mrs. Trapp since the murder. Jaspersen was apparently expecting no trouble from Trapp for on the afternoon of the tragedy he was at work in the Frazer saloon. Trapp entered and with few words shot Jaspersen to death. A struggle between Frazer and Trapp followed, in which the latter was disarmed, it is claimed, but he succeeded in getting away. He ran out of the city of Huntington a short distance and was found by officers secluded in sagebrush. When Jaspersen received the death dealing bullet from Trapp's pistol he fell backward and died with his pipe in his mouth.

Until testimony gives some insight into what Trapp's motive was for killing Jaspersen the matter will remain a mystery. Apparently all suggestions as to the cause of the rash act have been purely guesses as none have yet had explanation enough on which to stand. Immediately after the crime it was stated that jealousy over a woman was the cause, but soon that talk died away and with many it was discredited. Momentary insanity is suggested by some to have been the cause, with a morbid desire to shed the blood of some person.
