STABBING AT THE DALLES.

Shepherd and Saloon Bartender
Cut and Slew Human Flesh.

The Dalles, Oct. 2.—Andrew Wilcox was at the point of death at the Sanatorium and Joe Shoughnessy, a shepherd of Condon, is behind the bars at the county jail, being held without bonds on the charge of assault with intent to kill, as a result of a stabbing and cutting fracas which occurred at the Barn saloon last night.

Shoughnessy admits that he stabbed and cut Wilcox, who is the bartender at the Barn saloon. He told the officers this morning that he went into the

place last night where he had a few drinks. He says that he had a valuable dog with him and that he was going to leave at 11:30 o'clock, and at that time he could not find the canine. He contends that Wilcox stole the animal and placed it in a room adjoining the bar room.

When he tried to enter the room to get his dog, he says that Wilcox pushed him away from the door and repeated this performance when he tried to gain admission to the room the second time.

He told the officers that the third time he attempted to gain admission into the room, where he claims his dog was, that he drew his knife, that

Wilcox was too large a man for him to fight openly. Shoughnessy not only drew his knife but used the weapon as well. He cut the bartender across the lower part of the stomach, causing a long gash, then withdrawing the knife, stabbed him in the shoulder, and again stabbed him in the face, in so doing the blade of the weapon broke off and was not removed from the bartender's face until he was taken to the sanatorium.
