HUFFMAN DISPOSES OF INTEREST

Editor of Pendleton East Oregonian Has Dropped the Helm.

Pendleton, Oct. 6.—Through a trade that was consummated this forenoon, Bert Huffman disposed of his interest in the East Oregonian Publishing company, and he formally retires from the editorship of the paper. His place has been taken by E. B. Aldrich, former city editor, who has been serving in the capacity of editor during the past month.

Mr. Huffman's interest in the paper was purchased by Mr. Aldrich and Lee D. Drake, advertising manager.

As matters now stand the East Oregonian is owned by a company in which the following men are the stockholders: C. S. Jackson, Fred W. Lampkin, E. B. Aldrich and Lee D. Drake.

The change in the editorship of the paper will make the composition of the editorial staff as follows: E. B. Aldrich, editor; Edgar F. Averill, telegraph editor, and Harry Burke, city editor.

As in the past the business office corps will be composed of Fred W. Lampkin, business manager; Lee D. Drake, advertising manager, and Geo. Robbins, circulation manager. In addition to his past work, Mr. Drake will henceforth have charge of the mechanical department of the paper.

The Dalles Cleaning House.

At the meeting of The Dalles city council Saturday night, a communication, signed by about 15 citizens of the city, was submitted, asking for the removal of the houses of ill-fame from their present location. B. S. Huntington also introduced a communication, asking that an ordinance be adopted, the substance of which being to the effect that the houses of prostitution should be removed, submitting an ordinance also, which were it passed, would eventually drive the resorts from the part of the city in which they are now located.—The Dalles Chronicle.
