COVE TIED LOCAL HIGHS

All but defeated is the status in the high school-Cove game at Cove last Saturday, because Walters skirted the crowds and chased down two-thirds of the field for a touchdown. The score was five to five, but it tells the story inadequately, as La Grande made yardage repeatedly in the second half, while Cove failed to even once do the trick. Cove, with its offensive plays, pivoted on Harry Walters, the Island City whirlwind, made yardage in the first half occasionally, but never did it make consistent gains in the last half. Unprejudiced spectators were displeased with Walter's method of tackling—around the ears. The first half ended without a kicked goal, and then came the period in which La Grande played circles around their opponents. The locals worked the ball down the field to the three-yard line, where a fumble by Childers and a quick recovery by Rice planted the ball over the chalk mark. No goal was kicked. Repeatedly the ball was worked down the field to striking distance, but Cove, by recouping itself at the proper moment, prevented more scoring.
The only new face in the lineup for La Grande was Childers at full, and many of the yards of the total gained are credited to him. The members played like clockwork in the second half, and the same sort of game playing next Saturday will defeat Baker City. Cove outweighed La Grande considerably, but lacked the staying powers and failed to keep up the effective defensive work in the second, that it did in the first half. Conklin and Allen have whipped a fine team out of raw material, and the rest of the season will find Cove striving nobly for the honors which she yet has a chance to recover.

GREEK RIOT NEAR ELGIN

More than a half dozen Greeks were placed under arrest today between Elgin and the Looking Glass, on a charge of precipitating and carrying out a riot. The affair took place Friday, but the complaint was not made out until Saturday, and the arrests were to be made today.
The riot had true color, for clubs and guns played important parts in the demonstration, though it is said no shots were fired. The laborers are working under a sub-contractor named Hamilton, also a Greek, and Friday afternoon they became angered at something. They carried their anger into action and the sub-contractor had considerable difficulty in escaping unharmed. The complaint names several stable persons, unpronounceable names, and it is likely they will be arraigned tomorrow. A representative of county authorities went to the camp this morning to make the arrests.
