PUBLISH POLITICAL FUNDS

(Continued from page 1.)

The funds secured for carrying on a national campaign, although the socialists and other minor parties have done so.

Mr. Blodder declares that while there has been something of a financial stringency at democratic national headquarters, the prospects are now growing brighter and the fund is daily growing in volume. The German editor who succeeded Marshall as treasurer has made them more good, according to his colleagues, and it is declared that he is rapidly educating the "common people" to the knowledge that this is their campaign and that they must supply the means of war.

The national treasurer declares that he has implicitly obeyed Mr. Bryan's instructions in refusing contributions from favor-seeking corporations and trusts, and that no contribution has been accepted from any person who seeks favors in return.

An attempt has been made by the newspapers of William E. Hearst to create the impression that Bryan's promise to make public all campaign contributions tomorrow gives immunity afterwards, and that after tomorrow's report the bid will be put down. Thomas F. Ryan, August Belmont and Anthony N. Brady are named by Mr. Hearst as some of the trust magnates who are willing and anxious to contribute to the democratic campaign fund and will be allowed to do so. This statement is denied at democratic headquarters, and it is declared that the publicity program will be carried out fully and in good faith until the campaign has closed.

MASONIC HALL IS SELECTED

IMPORTANT COMMITTEE REPORTS ARE MADE.

At Meeting of General Committee, Sub-Committee Reports on Selection of Masonic Hall as Meeting Place of the Federated Clubs Convention.

The Masonic hall on Adams avenue will be headquarters for the convention of the Federated clubs in this city October 18-12, according to a report read before the general arrangements committee at the called session at the home of Mrs. F. S. Ivanhoe this afternoon. Mesdames George T. Cochran and N. Molitor make up the sub-committee on hall. The report will be sent in to the state officials at once.

This announcement sets to rest the worry and speculations which the general committee and the sub-committee have entertained ever since active preparations for the convention were opened. The selection is a splendid one, and, being centrally located, will prove convenient to visiting delegates and hostesses alike.

One Evening Unprovided for.

While the report covers every meeting of the convention itself, there is still one flaw to it, in that there has been no selection of the place in which to hold one evening's attraction of the program.
