SAMPLE OF THE BALLOT

SHOULD BE PROMPT
COUNT OF COUNTY VOTES.

With Only Four Names to Vote for Out of a List of 20, Voting and Counting Will Be a Matter of Dispatch—Sharp Contrast With Long Ballot of Last Spring.

There is one consolation about having district and state elections at a separate time from the presidential election, as there will not be as long a suspense period from the time the polls close until the ballots are counted in Union county, especially.

In sharp contrast to the long, complicated ticket of last spring, the ballot for the November election in this county will contain only the names of the 20 presidential electors, and the men whom each group of four represent. Every man knows for whom he is going to vote before he enters the booth, with the result that voting will be done rapidly and the votes will be counted at the same ratio of rapidity. It is very probable that the city of La Grande will know how its presidential vote stands, complete from every precinct, before midnight. With the systematic manner of compiling election returns which The Observer has heretofore demonstrated, a complete table should be in the local office from every precinct in the county before daybreak.
