## SUN SHINES AND FAIR ATTENDANCE IS INCREASED

WALLA WALLA FAIR DAMPENED MUCH BY RAIN.

After Several Days of Small Attendance, Thursday Saw Great Crowds at Garden City Fair—City is Evacuated.

Walla Walla, Oct. 15.—Today—Derby day—was a record-breaker for the fair, in attendance. With every place of business in the city closed, even to the drug stores, practically every man, woman and child in the city went to the fair grounds this afternoon, and the day was one to be long remembered by every body. With the first three days of the fair poorly attended on account of the weather, people were becoming very anxious to pay the fair a visit. This morning when the day promised to be a pleasant one, everybody, seemingly made preparations to go to the fair, and this afternoon the city is almost evacuated.

People commenced gathering at the grounds at an early hour this morning, and by 10 o'clock there was a large number of people who were viewing the many exhibits in the pavilion, and looking over the fine stock in the barns. The pavilion seemed to be the main attraction this morning, and before noon it swarmed with people. ## BROADEN SCOPE OF UNIVERSITY BULLETIN

BOON TO POOR OR BUSY SEEKER AFTER WISDOM.

One of the Most Valuable Adjuncts to the State University is Broadening Out to Cover Larger Field of Studies.

A new bulletin of the correspondence study department of the University of Oregon has just been received by The Observer. The scope of the work has been greatly enlarged over the beginning made last year, and now covers courses in English classics, Shakespeare, pedagogy, botany, history, algebra, geometry, trigonometry, analytic geometry and several courses in mathematics for teachers.

By means of this work any student who has not time to attend college or high school, can pursue, with hardly any cost, practically the same work by correspondence through the university courses, and receive credit for it. Thousands of dollars each year are sent out of Oregon to various correspondence schools, and the university believes that a large part of this might just as well be saved to the people of the state. The enrollment of this department will reach 3000 students for the year.
