M'GINN WILL SPEAK HERE

SINNOTT INFORMS LOCAL SECRETARY OF DATE SET.
 On October 30 One of the Leading Orators of the State Will Proclaim the Republican Gospel From a Local Rostrum—Full Announcement of Place Later.

Portland, Ore., Oct. 15, 1908.
 I beg to inform you that Hon. Henry E. McGinn of Portland, Ore., will speak in your city on the issues of the present campaign from a republican standpoint on October 30th.
 "It is not necessary for me to state that Mr. McGinn is one of the most brilliant orators in the northwest, and your citizens will no doubt hear a masterly presentation of the political questions of the day by Judge McGinn.
 "I would thank you to endeavor to have as many of your club members as can possibly do so attend this meeting and show that you are all taking an active interest in the campaign."
 That, in brief, is the information conveyed to Secretary F. B. Currey, of the local Taft-Sherman club from J. F. Sinnott, of Portland, president of the state republican league. The letter is self-explanatory, and, in due time, full announcement will be made in The Observer, as to place of the meeting, and other details in connection with Mr. McGinn's coming to this city in the interest of the republican party in Union county. As the letter states, McGinn is an adept at the orator's art and will prove himself one of the ablest men to come to the city during the present campaign.

Furnish Deal Consummated.
 By a deal practically consummated a year ago, but not fully completed until yesterday, the Furnish Ditch company becomes the sole owner of the ditches, canals, flumes, pipe lines and water rights together with the working equipment of the Inland Irrigation company, the original corporation handling the Furnish interests in the reclamation of the big tract in the west end undertaken some time ago by Mr. W. J. Furnish and his associates, says the Pendleton East Oregonian.

A King Hill Straw Vote.
 T. G. Montgomery said last night that while his brothers, A. B. and J. E. Montgomery, were at King Hill, Idaho, attending the opening of the big irrigation project that a straw vote was taken of the 700 men present, for president, and the result was over four to one in favor of Taft. The men present represented almost every state in the union and for that reason was considered highly significant. To illustrate, the many sections represented the first man to draw was from Pittsburgh, and almost all the other eastern states were represented.—Pendleton Tribune.

NEW RECORD ON STUB LINE

LONGEST TRAIN IN HISTORY OF ELGIN LINE.
 With a String of Cars, 40 in Number, Wallowa Train Arrives Last Evening With a New Record—Not the Heaviest, But the Longest Train, Say Pioneer Trainmen.

So far as it is within the memory of pioneer railroad men in this city, the train from Elgin last evening was the longest of any in the history of the road. Conductor J. C. Gulling is backed by others who have worked on the Elgin branch for many years, that last night's 40 loads have no precedent. The train from Wallowa was augmented in size at Elgin until 40 carloads were included in the long chain of cars. Nearly 50 per cent of the cars were one-deck sheep cars. For that reason the pull was not as great as many others have been but for length of train it stands as a record in the history of the road. This in a measure demonstrates the enormous business done on that road, and proves its standing as a feeder to the main line.
