WHO IS "MIZENER" ASK BAKER POLICE

STORY OF BROWN MURDER INFORMATION IS FAULTY.

No one in Baker City knows Mizener Spoken of in Press Dispatches From Sheridan—Baker City Officials Search for Such a Man, But Are Unable to Find Him.

Baker City, Oct. 16.—The story from Sheridan, Wyo., printed yesterday, in which A. S. Burroughs, a painter, who has worked in Baker City at different times, stated that he knew who blew up Harvey Brown, has been augmented by the police divulging the name of the man whom Burroughs accuses. He says the guilty man is Ed Mizener. No one here can be found who knows anything about Mizener. Some time ago there was a merchant here by that name, but he has since moved to Portland, and people who know him cannot conceive of his connection with the tragedy.

Mrs. Burroughs is at her home on Elm street, and states that she does not believe a word of her husband's statement, which was made in Wyoming. She says the night Harvey Brown was killed Burroughs was at home in bed. According to her statement Burroughs is given to peculiar stories, having at one time stated to her that he killed a policeman and shot the heel off of another officer.
