BRING COURT TO SCRIBER'S SIDE

The Latest.

The latest rumor on the street is to the effect that Mr. Scriber is to go into voluntary bankruptcy and the petition is to be filed as soon as prepared. The records do not show anything as yet if correct, it but goes to show that the depositors may expect little from Scriber's individual property if bankruptcy proceedings are instituted.

Total Defalcation.

The Observer last evening made the statement that the defalcations are in the aggregate, so far as known, to be about \$25,000. Since Mr. Scriber's bond has been fixed at \$15,000, and the charge against him being stipulated at \$12,525 as the amount of his misappropriations, it might be assumed that the above is the total. No one but the bank examiner knows the exact amount, and he will not state whether it is one dollar or whether it is \$30,000 or any other amount. It is known, however, that the warrant for his arrest was based upon information known prior to the arrival of the bunch of alleged forged paper held in Seattle, which amounted to \$15,000, and of this amount it was thought and so reported, that \$4500 was good paper, leaving a balance that was not good of \$10,500.

Yesterday Deputy District Attorney Evans stated that when he first came he thought his information, which was something like \$12,000, would be sufficient to hold him on, but since arriving other bad paper had come to light. While Mr. Evans did not refer to the Seattle matter, it was so understood, therefore, if the government had \$12,000 prior to this batch, it would seem that a general statement of about \$25,000 would not be far out of the way. However, this matter will all be made public later, and in case the defalcations do not exceed \$25,000, there is reason for the depositor to feel good, provided there is not too much worthless paper.

Texas State Fair.

Dallas, Texas, Oct. 17.—With an address by Governor T. M. Campbell, a special musical program and the dedication of new buildings, the 23d annual Texas state fair was opened here today and will continue 16 days. The livestock show, in which judging will begin on Monday, is one of the most notable ever held in the southwest. An offering of \$50,000 in stakes anurses has resulted in the entry of some of the best horses in the United States.

Hoosier Charities.

South Bend, Ind., Oct. 17.—The Indiana Conference of Charities and Corrections will convene in seven annual session here this evening. The meeting will end next Tuesday. At the opening session the president, D. George F. Edenharter, superintendent of the Central Insane hospital in Indianapolis, will deliver his address. Governor J. Frank Hanly will speak at a mass meeting tomorrow afternoon. Several other distinguished men will deliver addresses during the conference.

ANOTHER ROSE CITY MURDER

BODY OF OLD RESIDENT FOUND BENEATH DOCK.

Bad Wound on Head Leads to Belief That Murder Has Been Committed—The Deceased Was Well Known Throughout the West—Had Been Missing Since Saturday Last—Police Believe in Murder Theory.

Portland, Ore., Oct. 17.—What had the appearance of a foul murder is being investigated by the police here today. The body of Jack Nugent, an old resident of Portland and well known throughout the west, was found this morning beneath the dock along the Willamette Iron and Steel works, at the foot of Everett street. There is a bad wound on the head, and the body is badly bruised. The police say it is impossible for the man to crawl to where the body was found. Nugent has been missing since Saturday last.
