PORTLAND NEWS LETTER

MINISTERS CAN AID IN EFFECTIVE BOOSTING.

Oregon and Washington Stand as Peers in Dairying, According to Prominent Middle West Dairymen—Harper's Weekly to Extol the Northwest Features.

Portland, Ore., Oct. 19.—(Special correspondence.)—Hon. F. H. Scribner, president of the Wisconsin Dairymen's association, but more especially honored in the Pacific northwest as the breeder of "Loretta D" (belonging to the W. S. Ladd estate, Portland), the cow that won first prize in the 120-day milking test at the St. Louis exposition in 1904, has said:

"There is no spot in our great United States that can excel Oregon and Washington in dairying. This is my conclusion after spending six weeks in the former state and thoroughly investigating several of her beautiful valleys, and after an extended trip through Washington. I wish to say to the dairymen and farmers of this section, relative to its dairy possibilities, that I fear they don't fully appreciate the wonderful opportunity here for the raising of feeds best adapted to the dairy industry, and the excellent climatic conditions for the growth and development of stock. You should here reach the climax of productiveness."

Mr. Scribner's Wisconsin farm of 50 acres supports, under his skilled management, 30 head of stock. Even more successful than former displays was the Eighth Biennial Fruit fair at Hood River. A very large delegation went from Portland by special train on Saturday.

A very pleasing incident of the past week was the walking away with first and third prizes for best fruit displays by two Oregon towns at the Walla Walla fair, in Washington. Freewater secured first, and Milton third.

Harper's Weekly is planning a series of articles on the Pacific northwest, to appear in early issues, and J. K. Mumford, one of America's most prominent magazine writers, is personally gathering the data now.

Hon. John Barrett, director of the International Bureau of American republics, will spend this week in Washington and Oregon, making addresses at Tacoma, Seattle, Spokane and Portland. In this city he talks today to the members of the Portland Commercial club at informal after-lunch gathering, on "Oregon's Opportunities in the Pacific."

"If the community wants to get desirable immigration, it's certainly within the province of the ministers to help," is an idea that promises to bear fruit in many northwestern towns most active in presenting their claims to the country at large. Among his other announcements the minister asks his congregation for addresses of friends at distant points, and the commercial body co-operates by sending attractive literature and letters.

SEEKS ALFALFA DATA IN THE GRANDE RONDE

Information of the large crops of alfalfa grown in this valley and the editorial appearing in The Observer some time ago relative to the suitability of this city for the location of an alfalfa meal mill, has led one of the men who installed the Echo alfalfa meal mill to write The Observer, asking for additional information. He wants to know how much alfalfa is grown here before seeking additional questions. What his purpose is, is not made known in the letter, but it is presumed he is looking for a suitable place to instal a mill similar to the one at Echo that has been declared a good success from every standpoint. His questions will be answered in full and the matter turned over to the Commercial club for their further disposition.
