TRAINS TO ENTERPRISE

CONTINUE WALLOWA TRAIN ON MORNING OF NOVEMBER 2.

In Less Than Two Weeks Wallowa Train Will Be Continued to Enterprise—Big Banquet to Mark the Event—High O. R. & N. Officials to Be at the Scene That Day—May Mean Two Trains Out of La Grande Instead of One as at Present.

Regular train service will be inaugurated to Enterprise Monday, November 2, is the order of General Manager O'Brien, according to the Enterprise News-Record. Chief of Construction Brandon has orders to turn the road as far as Enterprise over to the operating department on that date, and he will have it ready for trains sure, just as he has made good on every other proposition in the construction line.

The news has also been received direct from Mr. O'Brien by the Enterprise Commercial club, with the further welcome information that he and other general officers of the road will visit Enterprise on that date and will be the guests of the club in response to its invitation, in a banquet at Fraternal hall, Monday night.

At a well attended meeting of business men and other citizens at the court house Tuesday night, the various plans and ways of properly celebrating the advent of the railroad were thoroughly discussed. An outdoor affair was practically out of the question, owing to the time of year. The excursion season is past and it is doubtful if a respectable sized crowd from outside points could be induced to make a second trip into the valley this fall. It was finally unanimously decided that the proposed banquet to the general officials would be the most fitting and at the same time do the most practical good for Wallowa county. The details of the banquet were referred to the executive committee of the Commercial club.

From a La Grande standpoint a matter of interest in this connection is what the train schedule will be. It is seldom indeed, that the present mixed train to Wallowa returns to this terminal on schedule time. What the hours will be when the train must go on to Enterprise is somewhat of a problem to the public.

It is noted about that two trains will be run to accommodate the traffic; the one leaving here in the morning remaining at the new terminal until the next day.
