QUITTERS! SAYS HERALD

Quitters! Rank quitters! The methods used by Jack O'Brien of baseball notoriety, still clings to La Grande, and took a prominent part in the football game there Saturday. There was trouble from the time the Baker team arrived until La Grande refused to finish the game, thereby forfeiting the game to Baker City by the score of 1 to 0.

In the first place La Grande tried to ring-in two rank outsiders, one who had started to school on Friday before the game, and another who intended to attend school. It was anything to beat Baker, but they overshot their mark. It was not a bona fide high school team, for they played Childers, who is well known here, having played baseball with La Grande. He tends bar in the morning and takes two studies in the afternoon.

Professor Mickleson, who coached the team, was referee during the first half, and penalized Baker on the merest pretenses, setting them back 50 yards at one time. It was through his efforts that La Grande made their touchdown, as they did not advance the ball more than 15 yards during the whole game, while Baker carried the ball more than 100 yards. Mickleson butted in and declared it to be La Grande's ball, while McKimm, the official to decide the play, said it was Baker's ball. La Grande refused to play and McKimm declared the game forfeited by the score of 1 to 0.

The boys here are eagerly awaiting the game between La Grande and Pendleton, for they predict La Grande will be defeated by a score of 30 to 0.

The above is too ludicrous to need reply. To him who was not at the game it is interesting reading, but to a spectator at the game, the story brands itself.
