THREE-TEAM BASKETBALL LEAGUE HERE

Temporary organization of a city basketball league was perfected last evening when a dozen devotees of the game met at the Coliseum rink for the purpose of taking preliminary steps in the movement. The results of the meeting are highly satisfactory and next Sunday afternoon the full and final arrangements will be made. At that time the rules committee, consisting of Jack O'Brien, Archie Bacon and Merrill Childers will make its report, which will embody the regulations whereby the three-team league will be conducted. A board of appeal or advisory board, consisting of the president and secretary of the club, the manager of each team in the league, and the manager of all athletic affairs will have full jurisdiction on all matters pertaining to the executive features. The managers of each team will be elected next Sunday afternoon and at which time the general manager will also be selected.

Three-Team League.
Aside from what outside games there may be played, there will be a series of home games that should excite good-natured rivalry. A complete schedule will be prepared and at the end of the season the winning team will be awarded a pennant purchased by a small percentage from the receipts of each game. The three teams in the league will be so arranged as to be as nearly on equality as it is possible to make them, insuring an interesting race for the home pennant.

Then, when outside teams come here, or La Grande goes elsewhere, the cream of the three teams will be picked to represent the city. The schedule will start in less than two weeks.

PUT TRUANTS IN CITY JAIL

Yesterday Truant Officer Faulk received notification from Prof. Hockenberry that a couple of the public school boys had been absent from school for several days without the proper excuse from their parents, and yesterday evening, after a careful search which lasted all day, he succeeded in finding them. They were promptly placed in the city jail and this morning were escorted to the school. While truancy is not a general vice among the school children there is just enough of it in evidence to make drastic measures a necessity. Professor Hockenberry has a list of boys who are known to "play hooky" whenever the spirit moves them to do so, and this list has been turned over to Officer Faulk with instructions to arrest them whenever he finds them on the streets during school hours.

Club Wheat Most Popular.
Club varieties make up fully 50 per cent of Walla Walla county's wheat crop this year, says the Walla Walla Times. So say men intimately acquainted with the local grain situation. Bluestem comes next with a proportion of between 20 and 35 per cent of the total yield, the remainder being made up of Turkey Red and other minor varieties.
The predominance of the club in this section over all other varieties is due to the fact that it yields the most profit. True it is, there is a disparity of two or three cents per bushel between Bluestem and Club, in favor of the former, but the greater yield per acre over bluestem makes the latter more profitable.
Bluestem is undoubtedly a better quality of wheat, as the price would indicate, and is used in the manufacture of the best grade of flour, including the fancy patent brands, while the club varieties are used for export purposes.
