There are in the field three other parties which propose to make a thorough canvass in this state, and whose appeals to the laboring classes are certain to fall upon many willing ears. In the first place, there are the socialists, led by Eugene V. Debs of Terre Haute, long the idol of the socialistically inclined throughout the middle west. It is asserted by both partisans and non-partisans in a position to know that there has been a remarkable growth of socialism in Indiana during the past three years. The leaders of the party have determined upon a vigorous campaign and the work of organization is being pushed systematically and effectively in all of the principal population centers.

Rest Before Huge Task.
Cincinnati, O., Oct. 21.—Taft arrived here this morning after the hardest few days of campaigning since he was nominated. He will spend the day at the home of his brother. Taft is very tired and his voice almost failed last night. He will seek entire relaxation today before starting his tour of Indiana.
