IRRIGATION COMMITTEES TO MAKE CLEAN-UP.

Indications Are That Big Majority of Required Amount of Land Will Be Subscribed in Less Than Two Weeks Aim is to Have Work Practically Completed in Two Weeks-Work is Slow and Arduous, But Men Work Diligently.

At the close of next week the com mittees in charge of solicitation of land for the irrigation project, will be ready to report what success has met their energy expended in this line. Preliminary reports on this matter indicate that a large block of the total requirement—the 20,000 acres—will be subscribed at that time. As is known, the valley has been divided into three sections and members of each of the three committees are hurrying to their task that the work may day. Already the list has grown to pleasing proportions, but there is yet week's time.
