**66 PENITENTIARY INMATES ARE PARDONED**

Walla Walla, Oct. 21.—Out of 200 applications acted on, the state board of pardons passed favorably on but 66, and the recommendations for these men were forwarded to Governor Mead today. Aside from these cases, the board recommends that 13 be discharged from parole, having fulfilled the terms of the paroles. The board today made public the results of its last meeting. Favorable action was taken on applications for 29 paroles and 37 final discharges.

Two Walla Walla men are affected, both being recommended for final discharge. They are George A. Clarke and George Edwards. Clarke was sent up July 19, 1907, to serve an indeterminate sentence for passing a worthless check for \$30 on A. Schwarz, the saloon keeper. George Edwards commenced serving a three-year term for forgery on September 25, 1906. It was charged that he passed a check for \$45 on Oscar W. Brunton, forging another man's name. Edwards was taken to the penitentiary on the day he was to have been married.

**Hurry-Up Wedding.**  
Being asked that the wedding ceremony be done up quickly and quietly, City Recorder J. M. Filloon united William Genaeus and Miss Sarah Minnick of Celilo in holy wedlock yesterday, tying the knot with the fewest words possible and speaking in a whisper during the entire ceremony, complying implicitly with the request for briefness and quietude.

The bride and groom arrived at the court house yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock and 12 minutes later Sarah Minnick had become Mrs. Genaeus. The young people desired to be married in a hurry. County Clerk F. R. Angle broke all records for issuing a license, while his deputy telephoned to City Recorder Filloon to rush over to the court house. The police judge "made that trip in less than it takes to count up ten" and jumped into the harness and did the marrying act in a manner that would lead one to believe that he did that kind of a stunt every day instead of doing the "It will cost you ten" and "\$5 for you" act.
