receivership are cared for, the liabilities will be increased. Just how much cannot be stated, though it will be enough to make a few cents on the dollar.

Stockholders Suffer.

A feature of the affair which the depositor seldom thinks of, is the fact that stockholders will be complete losers. Such items as capital, interest, exchange, taxes, premiums on bonds, expenses which the bank already incurred, will all be expunged from the records, meaning a heavy loss to the stockholder. This is done for the benefit of the depositor, and were it included in the net liabilities would reduce the paying powers materially.

Working for Depositors.

In an interview today Examiner Gatch said: "I am here for the depositors' interests and for no one else. I have charge of the bank's affairs for the benefit of those who have money in here, and I propose that those who have wronged the depositors should make it right as far as possible."

There is a report that funds were obtained from Scriber after close of business Saturday by threats of exposure of forgery.

The suspense entertained by depositors and the public alike, during the crisis, has been painful. Depositors were anxious to know what payments would be made, whether 50 or 25 per cent, just so the information was given out.

Kaiser's Son Weds.

Berlin, Oct. 22.—Prince August Wilhelm, fourth son of the German kaiser, today took unto himself a wife. The bride was his cousin, Princess Adelaide, of Schleswig-Holstein-Sonderburg-Glücksburg. The bridegroom is 21 and his bride is 19 years of age. The ceremony and attendant festivities were of an elaborate nature, although not so imposing as those identified with the marriages of the Crown Prince Frederick Wilhelm with Princess Cecilia of Mecklenburg and Prince Eitel Frederick with Princess Sophie of Oldenburg. Today was also the 50th birthday of the empress, who received many gifts and messages of congratulation from the monarchs of Europe. Prince August Wilhelm attained his majority on January 26 last. His royal father then presented to him the alternative of marriage or a post-graduate course at Harvard university. The prince, enamored by his pretty cousin, chose matrimony rather than a course of study at the famous American university. While the wedding was arranged by the kaiser, the young couple are apparently willing victims of royal etiquette and appear to be very much in love with each other.

MUTINY NEAR SAN PEDRO.

Old-Time Insurrection on Board Ship Off San Pedro Last Night.

San Pedro, Cal., Oct. 22.—Civil authorities re-enforced by a special squad of deputy sheriffs, went to the ship Aryan today at the request of Captain Whittier, to arrest the ringleaders in a mutiny, holding the ship's officers in terror for several months. The trouble has been brewing from the time the ship left Baltimore 174 days ago, because the captain would not permit them to go ashore. Last night the crew attempted to kill him, and a desperate fight resulted.
