## MAGAZINE LAUDS STATE

WEEKLY LETTER OF OREGON NEWS INTERESTING.

### Transportation: Fruit Exhibit in Portland—Great Draw Bridge is Successful—"Fruitgrower" Lauds Oregon With Extended Descriptive Write-up.

Portland, Oct. 26.—(Special correspondence.)—Assistant Secretary J. E. Wilson, of the United States Department of the Interior, and W. M. Geddes, of the Treasury department, Washington, D. C., were guests at the Portland Commercial club last Saturday. They are making a tour of the northwest.

"The Fruitgrower," of St. Joseph, Mo., has just issued a Homeowner's edition, which contains an extended report from all the fruitgrowing districts of the west, and no one state receives as much attention as Oregon. There is page after page of illustration and text, and every part of the state is given prominence. In fact, Oregon probably gets more attention than any other two states. This is true because the state is better organized, doing better advertising, has more good pictures and has learned how to present its resources and attractions better than any other state in the union.

No more beautiful publication has been issued in Oregon than the one just from the press, which gives most graphically the resources and attractions of Lincoln county. It is issued jointly with the commercial bodies of Newport, Toledo, Elk City and Waldport, and its central illustration is a bathing scene at Newport—the beach there is unexcelled on the Pacific coast.

The great draw bridge across the Willamette river, built jointly by the Great Northern and Northern Pacific railways and having the largest draw span of any bridge in the world, is a success. Work trains testing the bridge have passed to and fro for several days.

Hon. J. W. Bailey, state dairy and food commissioner, has been made chairman of the Season Ticket Sale of the Portland Country Club and Livestock association for 1909. Mr. Bailey is determined that 5000 tickets at \$5 each, must be sold before the close of the present year.

Producers of fine fruits throughout the northwest, and particularly those of Oregon, fully appreciate the help they are receiving from Portland merchants, who give up their show windows for a display of these products. Exhibits from Mosier and Lincoln county, Oregon, and Lewiston, Idaho, have attracted much attention the past week.

### PENDLETON HANDED LEMON. Lighter Walls Wallans Hold Pendleton Team to No Score.

The Pendleton-Walla Walla high school game last week was a no-score affair. Walla Walla was considerably lighter, though it withstood the onslaught of the visiting team in fine shape. This lets Pendleton out of the race for the northwest championship, and they have only Oregon left to conquer. The same team comes to La Grande in two weeks.

### Services for Prisoners.

An innovation in church work will begin Sunday afternoon when special services will be held at the county jail by Dr. T. B. Ford of the Methodist church, assisted by a band of singers. The services will include prayer, some hymns and a few remarks by Dr. Ford to the prisoners. There are now 11 men confined in the jail and they seem to welcome the plan which will be put into operation tomorrow—Pendleton East Oregonian.

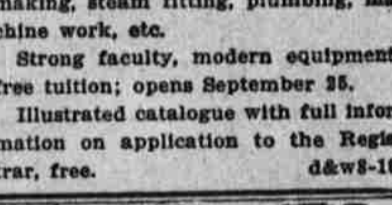
