FIND BODY OF LOST MAN.

One of Men Lost in Washington Mountains Dies of Exposures.

Tacoma, Oct. 24.—Julius Kumble, who with Fred Klober was lost in the mountains near Hot Springs, Wash., since Monday, was found dead yesterday, lying on the north slope near the extreme top of Rooster Comb. He had boughs under his head as a pillow, evidently placed there by Klober, who is still missing. It is supposed he is dead too, and men are searching for the body.

Mad Mullah is Off Again.

Aden, Oct. 26.—According to reports received here, the Mad Mullah will renew hostilities at the conclusion of Ramadan tonight. Pious scruples have rendered the Mullah inactive for some time, but with the passing of Ramadan, serious trouble is feared by the authorities of Berbera. Several companies of native infantry have been sent from this place to British Somaliland. There is much unrest among the natives and the outbreak may become serious.

cases of a sensational docket for the present term of circuit court. Moore is charged with killing the negro following personal differences on a ranch 12 miles from Union. The state, it is said, will fight the case bitterly, while the defense will be no less fierce. Many witnesses will be called, a large number of them having already drifted to the city from Mahan, North Powder and Telocaset. Moore has many friends who are watching the case closely and will be on hand to learn of any new development in the trial. Later: The jury is selected.

the bank, Scriber has acknowledged burning fraudulent paper to the amount of \$70,000, and it is feared in some quarters that in his haste to cover up his criminality, he may have burned up some good notes.

A Clever Scheme.

It is also reported that there are held a number of certificates of deposit of which there is no record in the bank. These are said to have been victoriously executed in the following manner:

The Farmers & Traders National bank blank certificates of deposit are issued in tabs of 100 each, numbered consecutively. Scriber used those of which he made no record from pads that in the natural order of business would not have been reached for at least five years. Thus this scheme, like some others, was difficult to detect until a thorough overhauling was undertaken.

Forgeries Amazingly True.

Those who have seen the forged paper were amazed at the cleverness in which the signatures were executed. In some instances the men upon whom the forgeries were committed could not have told but what they signed themselves had they had such notes outstanding. Other bad paper is readily detected when compared with the genuine signatures.

Not a few have entertained that, notwithstanding all of the shortage, forgeries and embezzlement, that no serious punishment would follow. The government is reported to have such conclusive evidence, and in addition to this, Scriber has confessed to more than one official, that there are enough known charges upon which convictions could be obtained that would compel Scriber to remain in prison the remainder of his life. The only thing for Scriber to do is to make a clean breast of the entire matter and throw himself on the mercy of the court, which might pass sentence upon one or two counts and dismiss the others. The very least sentence that could be imposed is five years.

There was some talk for a few days that Scriber's relatives would pay up the shortage and things would be smoothed over. This is all street talk with little, if any foundation.

It is rumored that Judge Wolverton in Portland, has stated that when the Scriber case comes before him he will either call in a judge from California or from Montana. Those who are versed in legal matters pertaining to the United States District court, say that Scriber will be most fortunate to have any judge preside over his case other than Judge Hunt of Montana. Judge Hunt is no stranger to the bar of Oregon. He presided in quite a number of land fraud cases.

May Pay 25 Per Cent.

The depositors may as well face the music one time as another. They will be fortunate, indeed, if they realize 25 cents on the dollar. In proportion to the capital involved and the business transacted by this bank, it is said to be one of the worst failures that has occurred on the Pacific coast in many years.
