SPECIAL CARS FOR ROOTERS

A special car—perhaps two special cars—will be used in carrying Pendleton's delegation to Baker City upon the first train of Pendleton and Baker high schools meet upon the station in that city on Friday, November 13, says the Pendleton East Oregonian.

Arrangements for the trip made for a tourist sleeper which will be used in carrying the team and its friends to Baker and if, when support is sought, enough people signify their intention of accompanying the team, it is possible that two cars will be secured. A special rate has been secured of \$5 for round trip, railroad fare and \$2 round trip Pullman.

The car will be left here the evening before the game and those who secure reservations may enter at any time and get a good night's rest by getting to sleep before the car is attached to No. 6. At Baker the car will be used as headquarters for the team, and in returning the car will be left at Pendleton so that those desiring to remain in their berths all night may enjoy an unbroken rest.

About 30 high school students aside from members of the team, and a number of business men and friends of the school have signified their intention of joining in the pilgrimage into the enemy's country.

NEW DEPOT ABOUT DONE

North Powder, Oct. 26.—The News says: The new depot is rapidly nearing completion and should be ready for use in about 20 days, Foreman Wendell says, providing there is no further delay in getting material.

It is a two-story structure, with a Mansard roof. The waiting room is 15x24 feet, with two large double windows at the back and one at the end. The office is 15x20, with a big bay window in the front.

The freight room is 22x24, with entrance at front and back. The intention at present is to have no wooden platform before the waiting room, but to fill in the space with cinders or decomposed granite, forming a sort of concrete platform 400 feet long.

The living rooms above will be plastered. There are four comfortable rooms, with closets, pantry and porch. The ceiling, plastering, putting on the paroid roofing, remain to be done. The building will be painted a dark yellow.
