Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday, the 24th day of November, 1908, a special election will be held of the voters of the City of La Grande, Union county, Oregon, and that the polls will be open from the hour of 9 o'clock a. m., until the hour of five o'clock p. m., of said day.  
Said election is called by order of the Council of the City of La Grande for the purpose of proposing and submitting to the people of the City of La Grande the approval and adoption of certain amendments to the charter of the city of La Grande as shown by the proposed charter heretofore approved by the council of the City of La Grande by ordinance No. 292, Series 1908, and filed with, and in the office of the recorder of the city of La Grande, on the 10th day of September, 1908.

The approval of these amendments by the people of the city of La Grande will be submitted to the voters on the following proposition:

which Mr. Cannon represents in congress, are prone to think him as an old-time farmer representing an old-fashioned farmer constituency. His personal appearance and manner of speech have encouraged such belief. Any such conception, however, conveys a wrong impression of the situation. There are, to be sure, thousands of farmers—and very prosperous farmers—scattered the greater part of a county, but the public servant Mr. Cannon is supposed to be, but his chief source of strength is in the cities and towns, rather than in the rural districts. A representative example of these communities is Danville, where he maintains his personal residence and central political garrison. Danville is an important junction point for steam and electric interurban railways, and has railroad repair shops, lumber mills and factories of various kinds. In the immediate neighborhood are coal mines that give employment to more than 2000 miners. All the trades represented are well organized, and indeed Danville is a hotbed of trade unionism. The hard fighting which has been forced on Congressman Cannon this year has had the effect of inducing him to spend more of his time at his Danville home. In certain previous campaigns he has felt that he had the situation in his own district so well in hand that he could swing around the circle and do a little missionary work for some of his colleagues or for the national ticket, but this autumn he has devoted himself energetically to the task of keeping his own political fences in repair.

Roosevelt family.  
Today is also the anniversary of the president's first marriage with Alice Hathaway, on October 27, 1880, who died on February 14, 1884, two days after giving birth to Alice Lee Roosevelt, now Mrs. Nicholas Longworth. The president's second marriage, with Edith Kermit, took place on December 2, 1886, and five children, four of them boys, have resulted from this union.

The president was born on October 27, 1858, in New York, and was the son of Theodore Roosevelt, Sr., collector of the port of New York, who died in 1878. He is of old Dutch stock, tracing his ancestry back to Claas Martenszen van Rosenvelt, who emigrated from Zealand, Holland, to New Netherlands in 1649.

## EMBEZZLEMENT CHARGE

is accused by O. F. Coolidge as private prosecutor, of the crime of embezzlement, committed as follows:

The said J. W. Scriber on the 10th day of October, A. D. 1908, in the county of Union and the state of Oregon, being then and there an officer an employe, to-wit: the cashier, of the Farmers & Traders National Bank of La Grande, Oregon, a private corporation, did then and there feloniously embezzle and fraudulently convert to his own use the sum of \$391.41, lawful money of the United States, an exact description of said money being to the private prosecutor unknown, said money being then and there the personal property of the said Farmers & Traders National bank, and a deposit therein of the said private prosecutor, and which \$391.41 then and there came into the possession and under the care of the said J. W. Scriber by virtue of his being such officer and employe of said bank, contrary to the statutes in such cases made and provided, and against the peace and dignity of the state of Oregon.

## Fearing a "Getaway."

Mr. Coolidge was one of the bondsmen who feared Scriber would disappear and leave the burden of the bonds on their hands. When it became publicly known last evening that Scriber was out on \$15,000 bonds when the shortage of his bank were \$120,000 or more, Mr. Coolidge and others were anxious to have their names withdrawn. The action taken today is presumably to hold Scriber here on additional bonds or in the jail until such a time as the government takes hold of his case.

The bondsmen, or rather some of them, felt that Scriber's absence would be a heavy financial loss to them, and while not so stated, it is the general opinion of those next to
