M'GINN HERE OCTOBER 30

The republicans will close the presidential campaign in this city next Friday night, October 30, when James McInn will deliver a speech at a rally at the Steward opera house. McInn is making a whirlwind campaign of eastern Oregon that will draw to a close the evening before election. McInn is one of the best speakers of the republican state bureau, and the committee is holding him out until the last. While politics have been confined to parlor discussions principally heretofore, it seems they will lose their tepidity a day or two before the final hour. Various committees will be working to get the house well filled for McInn's arrival.

NEARLY LOCAL OPTION IN WASHINGTON NOW

Olympia, Oct. 27.—What in effect is almost equivalent to a local option law is already contained in the statutes of this state, under a ruling of the supreme court in an opinion just handed down. This law, as construed by the supreme court, gives city councils authority to regulate, restrain, license or prohibit the liquor traffic, without having their proceedings subjected to court review.

In the case in question the City of Puyallup last June revoked all outstanding liquor licenses and provided for the refund of license money advanced by the liquor dealers.

In a previous case the supreme court has held that the city council had exclusive jurisdiction in revoking a license for cause. In the Puyallup case the order of revocation was not based on cause.

William Meservey and George West, who possessed an unexpired liquor license, sought a writ of review in the superior court, and the city applied to the supreme court for a writ of prohibition restraining the lower court from proceeding under the writ of review.

The supreme court grants the writ of prohibition, holding that the jurisdiction of the city under Section 5714, Pierce's code, is exclusive.

Under this provision, it is therefore only necessary for the people to elect an anti-saloon city council to abate the liquor traffic in such city.
