GOOD ROADS MEETING ON

The Good Roads convention which is now in progress in this city, is being fairly well attended by the business men and farmers of the valley. President Collier of the Commercial club, called the meeting to order and called upon Hon. Walter M. Pierce to outline the objects of the meeting. While Mr. Pierce is known to be one of the business men in the county, he soon demonstrated that he appreciated the value of good roads and cited the fact that old New York state was at this time spending \$50,000,000 in roads and local communities as much more. Only one thing in this county was of such importance as good roads, and that was the irrigation problem that is now before the people, but he turned this into a logical and practical boost for good roads by showing that irrigation would so increase property values and increased population would result in good roads.

President Scott, of the state Good Roads movement, was then introduced and was on the floor at the time of going to press, demonstrating what was being done throughout the state in the way of organizing county leagues and work toward securing needed legislation at the coming session of the legislature.

President Scott paid a glowing tribute to the productivity of our valley and hopes in the near future to own no less than 100 acres of our fruit land.

He has just returned from Baker county, where a league was organized, and it is certain that with the enthusiasm and attendance this afternoon, Union county will not falter in her duty.

Teachers Entertained.

A very pleasant hour was spent in the primary room of the high school building today at noon, when the teachers of the grades entertained those of the high school at a very informal luncheon. Although the number seated was found to be 13, it seemed to have no depressing effect upon those present.

Shea Claims Record.

Sioux City, Iowa, Oct. 28.—White lime was the cause of the downfall of John Shea, once a respected farmer of this vicinity, who holds a record of having broken into jail 61 times in the last six years. It is alleged that Shea drinks pints of a decoction of white lime, which results in a species of intoxication unknown to libbers of milder varieties of liquor. For the 61 times that he has been arrested for indulging his fad, Shea has been sentenced to a total of 539 days in the county jail.
