Will Be Required by Receiver Neidner to Look Over Affairs.

Receiver Neidner states that it will require his time for several days to look over the affairs of the closed Farmers & Traders National bank, and that he will not be in a position during this interim to meet the public during business hours.

tion if the bank can hold this, since it is known that he has filed his petition in bankruptcy.

In his petition he cites the fact that his personal property is valued at \$37,000 with debts of \$94,000. Anyone knows that it is not expected that under forced sale, as will be the case under bankruptcy proceedings, that the property will pay the debts and expenses. Mr. Scriber says the bank, if properly handled, will pay dollar for dollar. This is absurd; what it may pay no one at this time can tell. Those most interested claim it will pay out 50 per cent. There are others who would be more than glad to sell their claims at this figure. There are so many things yet that cannot be ascertained. For instance, those officers having county, school and city funds are now having attorneys investigate if the law will warrant these claims being classed as preferred, alleging they were trust funds.

It is also well known that some of the stockholders have sold their stock to Mr. Scriber and the same was not transferred on the books. Here is a chance for litigation. Another point which in some measure will cut down the percentage is where a man holding a note for \$500 and has a deposit, this deposit is credited in full, whereas if he had not have been a debtor to the bank he would only have been paid pro rata. This will cut down straight depositors some, possibly not very much.

It is evident that there will be more or less litigation before the final account is filed.

It is taken that upon the organization of a new bank it will probably take care of all the good paper. This will naturally result in a saving and at the same time makes payments, or at least portions quicker than would otherwise be possible. It is one of these problems where the depositor can figure himself not nearly so bad as it might have been, or he can look upon the other side with little comfort. It will require some little time before Receiver Neidner will know very much about it. One of the greatest unknown quantities is to tell how much of the remaining unburned paper is good.

The interview from Scriber follows: "I will not try to give bonds, as it would be only a few days before some other charge would be brought up and there would be more bonds to give. "And I have not tried to get away, and if I had wanted to do such a thing I have had hundreds of chances to do so. But there is nothing of the run-away kind in my make-up. The door is open now and all that is to be done is to walk in. There should have been enough left in the bank to pay out and there will be unless too much is eaten
