Take Screens Away.
Pendleton, Oct. 29.—Mayor Murphy sounded the death knell of screens, as a feature of the near-beer saloons of Pendleton this morning when Chief of Police Tom Gurdane received orders to proceed with a strict enforcement of the city's ordinance providing that all such obstructions should be at once removed, and that all near beer saloons provided with windows through which the entire interior of the rooms so used might be seen from the street on which they are located.

The mere removal of frosted glass from screens hitherto used will not be sufficient, according to Mayor Murphy, the screens themselves must go. And there must be no substitutes therefor. The business offices which have hitherto occupied the windows of several saloons must be moved. Everything within, every person, be he behind or before the bar, must be plainly visible from the street. Although the saloon men were notified of this order this morning and it takes effect immediately, the saloon men will be allowed three more days in which to comply with the ordinance. After that "It may be that we will have to make some arrests and levy some fines," said Mayor Murphy this morning, "but we will do so if the ordinance is not enforced. We believe that the ordinance is legal in every respect, and that it is just, and the council meant just what it said when it ordered that the screens must go."

Hurry Interurban Line.
"We are now in a position to go ahead with our preliminary arrangements for building the Walla Walla-Pendleton interurban line," declared E. S. Isaacs in a 'phone message to the East Oregonian this afternoon. "Until we secured the franchise from the city of Walla Walla we were blocked temporarily as though by a dam," said he in speaking of the fight the company has had in the Garden City.

Continuing Mr. Isaacs declared that the money for the company's project was secured many weeks ago, so that there is no difficulty upon that score. Apparently everything is now clear for the carrying out of the company's plans. "We have had men at work for the past two weeks developing the company's power site," said Mr. Isaacs. "As to just when construction work will be undertaken on the electric line I do not wish to say at this time. We are now busy with the preliminary work."

MONSTER TAFT PARADE.

Seventy-Five Thousand Men Will Parade in New York Saturday.

New York, Oct. 29.—With Rear Admiral Coghlan as grand marshal and Commander W. B. Franklin chief of staff, 75,000 New York business men will march through the downtown streets tomorrow in a great Taft demonstration. The affair has been promoted by the Business Men's Republican association, and every line of trade in the city will be represented in the imposing pageant. Many million-dollar bankers and brokers have signified their intentions of taking part in the parade.

The line of march probably will be from Bowling Green, up Broadway through the heart of the downtown business district to Waverly place, and across to Fifth avenue, and to Fortieth street. There will be a reviewing stand at Madison Square, where the marching business men will be reviewed by the vice-presidential candidate, James S. Sherman; Secretary Elihu Root, and others.

An interesting announcement of the committee is that nearly 3000 lawyers are expected to be in line. Brass bands have been collected from every part of New York state, Connecticut and Massachusetts.

MOORE ACQUITTED.

First Vote Showed Majority Favored Conviction—Re-read Instructions.

Though James Moore has been acquitted of the charge of killing the negro sheepherder near Telocaset, the first ballot taken by the jury shows that a majority of the men favored conviction. The first ballot taken was seven to five for conviction. For several hours during the afternoon, the vote see-sawed around a half and half proposition until finally the vote arranged itself 10 to 2 for acquittal. There the jury stood for another long period. Close to midnight it asked for a re-reading of the judge's instructions. This done, the 12 men retired to their chamber and cast a vote that was unanimous for acquittal.

Moore is now a free man and puts another precedent on record where human blood was spilled unavenged. The jury based its verdict on the fact that evidence proved Moore was defending his own life in shooting another.

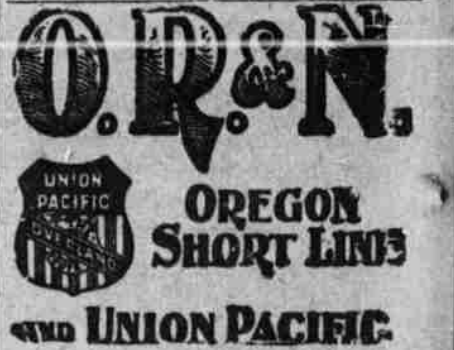
