SEEK CLUB FARM.

Chance to Sell Underdeveloped Land Suitable for Orchard to a Club.

A party of Pennsylvania are seeking a location for a club fruit farm in Union county. In a private letter they ask the following:  
 "An article in the Morning Oregonian has been sent me, from issue of January 1, 1908. I am interested in apple and pear lands. A club is being formed here to buy a tract of 100 to 500 acres suitable for the cultivation of such fruit. We want unimproved, cheap land of the best grade, which is similar to that which has been successfully used for such purposes. It must not be too far from a railroad, but may be somewhat in advance of development. We want to arrange for monthly payments, extending over a period of four to five years.  
 "If you know of any parties holding such land for sale, will you be good enough to put me in touch with them? I would, moreover, be obliged for any information along these lines which you may care to furnish me.  
 "Are there not logged over lands which will adapt themselves perfectly to this purpose after being cleared, which can be bought cheaply? Is such soil appropriate to such fruits?"  
 "If any of our readers knows of anything that is likely to fit the requirements, addresses and information can be left with the Observer, where it will be forwarded to the parties."

**DISAPPEARS TO AID FATHER.**  
 High School Girl Leaves Home Rather Than Appear Before Father.  
 Tillamook, Oct. 29.—Just a week before the time he was to have been

called before the grand jury to testify against her father, Eva Wolff, a high school student disappeared. The father, William Wolff, is confined in jail in default of \$5000 bonds. He is accused of serious private crimes. His daughter was the only witness. Wolff first achieved notoriety in this section on July 4, when he flaunted a red flag over the Stars and Stripes. For this offense he was arrested and is awaiting trial under a bond of \$500.

NEW SAWMILL.

**Haz a Six-Years Run Ahead of it and Means Another Payroll.**  
 Charles Dunn and Al Gpod were busy this week removing the Richardson sawmill to its new location on the Clark homestead above Glass hill, about six miles due south of La Grande. The new owners of the mill, T. C. Coombs & Co., expect to greatly enlarge the capacity and will have about a six-years run in its new quarters. They expect to cut out all the large body of timber lying on the divides between Sheep, Rock and Ladd creeks. There are not less than 25,000,000 feet of saw timber in that locality and it is said the quality is excellent. The company has already contracted for the H. Clark, M. Clark, Joe Clark, George Grout, Ike Winn and part of the John Anthony timber.

This will mean an additional payroll for several years to come, for La Grande.

CASE ON TRIAL.

**Attorneys Making Their Final Arguments in Riot Case.**  
 The attorneys in the case of the State against four Greek railroad laborers, charged with riot, are making their final arguments and the case will go to the jury about 4 o'clock. From the evidence it seems that a man by the name of Hamilton, time-keeper and interpreter, reported to the railroad company that the four defendants were shirking their duty, and when the order arrived for their discharge they made a protest in the way of a demonstration wherein a revolver, rifle and sticks and stones were used along with threats. This racket—or riot—was kept up for a considerable length of time, although no personal injury resulted.
