Box Social a Success.

The box social at the Dry Creek school house Friday evening, October 23, was a grand success. Before the selling of the boxes and cakes, a short program, which seemed to be appreciated by the audience, was rendered by the school. A fairly large large was in attendance; but for some reason or other there were only 15 boxes. The boxes were in demand. When all were sold and the clerk counted the cash, there had been \$2.10 taken in, making the boxes average about \$1.40 each.

Then came the most interesting and exciting time of the evening—the selling of the cakes. The cakes were sold as advertised. One given to the lady receiving the most votes for being the most popular lady; the other one to the man receiving the most votes for being the ugliest gentleman. The former was sold first. The names of the candidates were soon put before the house. The following ladies were the candidates: Miss Fern Conrad, of the Star district; Misses Effie Baker and Olive Bull, of Pleasant Grove district, and Misses Dora Nelderer and May Colt, the Dry Creek representatives. From the very first the contest was full of life and merriment. This was the first contest of its kind in the district, but it did not need very much of an introduction.

After a long hard struggle time was called and the following number of votes had been cast for each person: Miss Conrad, 430; Miss Baker, 2030; Miss Bull, 25; Miss Nelderer, 2463 and Miss Colt, 399. Miss Baker received the cake. These votes being worth one cent each, the cake brought the enormous price of \$59.94.

The men's cake was then sold. Owing to a late hour and the boys had been very liberal with their money on the other cake, this cake did not sell very high, nor was the selling so exciting. Then following men were the candidates, with the number of votes to their credit: Mr. Woodell, 175; Fisher, 55; Klees, 7, and Wilson 141. Woodell got the cake, it bringing in a total of \$3.57.

The total proceeds of the social amounted to \$34.91. I think this is a record-breaker for Union county for the year. The late hour, with the excitement of the evening, sharpened the appetites of the ladies who had brought boxes, and the boys and men who were fortunate enough in getting boxes, and everyone enjoyed a good supper after the selling of the boxes and cakes. The crowd then adjourned well pleased with the evening's work.

Simon Woodell acted as clerk, and D. C. Wilson as auctioneer.

High Price for Farm Land.

Almost \$110 per acre is the price paid for a quarter section of high grade wheat land adjoining the town of Athena which was sold by W. H. Reeder and wife to William Willaby by a deed filed this morning, with Recorder Hendley, says the Pendleton East Oregonian. The quarter section is one of the best wheat farms of that size in Umatilla county.
