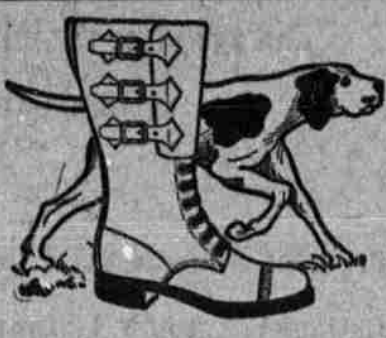

FACTORY IS RUNNING

The George Palmer Lumber company's box factory is being tentatively operated the last few days of this week. Small orders for local people are being filled, though no effort whatever toward filling large orders has been made. This is due to the fact that one or two pieces of essential machinery are not in place, in fact, have not arrived yet. But there is enough of the machinery in working order to turn out a few apple boxes.

"Printing Press" Coming.

The most up-to-date and complete "printing press" in eastern Oregon box factories is expected here daily. It is a three-color arrangement that labels the boxes—printing on the wood the grower's name, a picture of the fruit and a neat background of leaves. For instance, a tomato would be represented in red, the leaves in green and the lettering in black. The color combination puts the machine in a class by itself. The present crew is but a diminutive one, to be enlarged when the factory wheels turn after final completion of the new adjunct to the big mill.

Special Election to Approve Charter Amendments.

Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday, the 24th day of November, 1928, a special election will be held of the voters of the City of La Grande, Union county, Oregon, and that the polls will be open from the hour of 9 o'clock a. m., until the hour of five o'clock p. m., of said day.

Said election is called by order of the Council of the City of La Grande for the purpose of proposing and submitting to the people of the City of La Grande the approval and adoption of certain amendments to the charter of the city of La Grande as shown by the proposed charter heretofore approved by the council of the City of La Grande by ordinance No. 322, Series 1928, and filed with, and in the office of the recorder of the city of La Grande, on the 10th day of September, 1928.

The approval of these amendments by the people of the city of La Grande will be submitted to the voters on the following proposition:

Shall the City of La Grande amend its charter and approve the amendments to the city charter, and the new city charter proposed and submitted by the council to the people of the city of La Grande?

The following are the polling places, judges and clerks of the several wards designated and appointed by the council:

Third Ward, Building west of Judge Ramsey's residence on Penn. avenue—Judges: C. C. Pennington, B. W. Grandy and John Cates. Clerks: C. A. Vurpillat and A. C. Williams.

Fourth Ward, Harris' Hall—Judges: Bernard Logsdon, G. E. Fowler and John Sheak. Clerks: C. J. Vanderpool and Warren P. Noble.
