INVITATIONS NOT LIMITED

FEDERATION MEETINGS OPEN TO EVERYONE

When State Convention Occurs Next Week, Learned Club Women Can Be Heard by Every One—Invitations General—President Outlines Field and Scope of Work in Annual Report to General Convention—Is an Active Body of Women.

When the State Federation of Women's clubs convenes in this city next Tuesday—one week from today—the subsequent sessions that will bring out instructive papers, interesting musical numbers and addresses of learned club women, will not confine admission to club women alone. Any lady in the city—and gentlemen, too—will receive a warm reception at the hands of the entertaining clubs of this city, and the delegates from other clubs of the state. The instructive features of the convention should be heard by as many as possible. Special stress is always given the invitation of non-club women, and the same thing is true in La Grande this time.

What the Federation Does.
 Non-club women are oftentimes unaware of the scope of the work done by the Oregon federated clubs. A most exhaustive yet concentrated review of what the club federation does, is told by the present incumbent of the president's office, who will be in La Grande next week, and who in Boston last June made the following report from Oregon to the ninth biennial convention of the general federation of women's club:

(Mrs. Sarah A. Evans, of Portland.)
 Madam President and Members of the Convention:
 The Oregon federation numbers 49 clubs with an individual membership of about 1800. Our standing committees correspond with the standing committees of the General Federation of Women's clubs, though we do not attempt aggressive work along all these lines. Our greatest achievement this past year was securing an appropriation of \$120,000 for a home for the feeble-minded, for which we had been working for six years.

In co-operation with the Retail Grocers' association, we secured a state pure food bill, which conforms in every particular with the national bill. The energy of our pure food committee has been devoted to securing personal market inspection for every town in the state where there is a woman's club. We did active work in securing the 10-hour law for women, which has made Oregon famous, and as club women, we have return thanks to Justice Brewer for the decision that affects all women workers throughout the land.

We always maintain federation headquarters at the Chautauquas of the state, and have morning classes studying along different lines of club work, with some able leader brought to us for the purpose. This year we are to have Miss Clark of Missouri, chairman of our national civil service committee.

We established an educational loan fund a little over a year ago, and at present we have \$700 loaned to five young women who would otherwise have had to leave college.

Our individual club work is splendid and includes every branch of club activities, and much outside of the beaten path. One club of girls in their teens carried 700 bouquets to the hospital in the three summer months. Another small club paid for expert treatment for a cripple boy. Another club helped financially 125 persons, visited 395 sick people and distributed 1623 garments in one year. Another club maintains a neighborhood house for free kindergarten, domestic science, manual training and many other things.

Federations in Oregon have been slow of growth, but a visit from our national president, Mrs. Decker, last year, gave it an impetus from which we are still feeling the good effects, and we hope during the next two years many of our clubs will become members of the general federation. The circulation of the "Federation Bulletin" has increased, I think, and it is valued by all who take it.

The bureau of information has been of invaluable help in building up our

federation, and I bring many thanks from many Oregon club women for the generous and courteous treatment they have received from Mrs. Wood.

For the first time in its history the hall of representatives of our state capitol was thrown open for a convention and loaned for the annual meeting of the Oregon federation this year. The hall was crowded at every meeting, with eager, earnest club women, and a large audience of men and women greeted Mr. Enos Mills when he pleaded so earnestly for the preservation of our Oregon forests. The evening reception in the senate place was as brilliant as it was unusual, and we were all inspired with the feeling that the Oregon club women had had a glimpse of poetic justice and our session in the house of the law maker of the state was a portent of the future.

FIVE AUTOS SOLD TODAY

Through the J. R. Oliver agency, five E. M. & F. automobiles have been sold to Union county autoists, two of them living in La Grande. Though the contracts were closed today, the shipment will not be made until February, at which time a carload will be distributed here. The buyers are G. M. Richey and H. L.
