SEATTLE EXPOSITION

GATES WILL OPEN ON THE FIRST DAY OF JUNE.

Oregon and California Will Have Representative Buildings in Proportion to Their Respective Greatness—Everything is Being Made Ready for One of the Greatest Expositions Held West of the Mississippi River.

Seattle, Nov. 4.—(Special correspondence.)—On the first day of June, 1909, the gates of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition at Seattle will open. Every building will be finished, every seasonable exhibit will be in place, every road will be paved, every path laid out, every garden will be radiant with flowers. If the visitor comes on the last day, or in August, or on the opening day, he or she will find things the same. The promise of the officials of the exposition to break all previous records and thus establish a precedent will be realized. Seattle men felt that they must live up to the reputation of the city as a place that does big things and they are acting with characteristic promptness, energy and enterprise.

A month ago the gates of the exposition were closed to free admission. The day was celebrated by a vast meeting of the stockholders held on the steps of the huge manufacturers building. The director general presented figures showing that the exposition was more than 70 per cent complete, eight months remains for the finishing touches.

Three of the great permanent buildings which will be turned over to the University of Washington at the end of the fair are finished. A fourth will be completed by January 1. The two main exhibit palaces, the Manufactures and Agriculture buildings have been finished for several months. The Mining palace and the Fisheries building are ready, the hospital and the fire station have been in use for months. The power plant is ready to start up. Oregon finished her palatial building in September; California will have her immense building completed by January 1. The Washington State building, which will be permanent, is going up rapidly.

The green houses which have been in operation for two years, have over a million plants, including 250,000 rose bushes ready for transplanting. The decorative features of the exposition will be one of the most distinctive parts of the brilliant show. The roses, the festoons of vines that are found everywhere, the acres of green lawn, the giant firs and cedars will rest the eyes, and visitors will not wonder that Washington is called the Evergreen state.

built from Wenatchee to Walla Walla by way of the Columbia and Snake rivers to the mouth of the latter, when it will branch off across country to the Garden city. The dispatch from Yakima says:

"The location map for the electric line that proposes to follow the Columbia river from Wenatchee to the mouth of the Snake river and then cross the country to Walla Walla, has just been approved by the general land office for a part of the distance, and it is believed that construction will begin before very long. The portion that has been approved lies within the district of the North Yakima land office. It has its beginning at the foot of Priest Rapids and follows easterly along the south bank of the Columbia river to Hanford and White Bluffs, thence turns southerly to the big bend in the Yakima river. It will then follow the banks of the Yakima and Columbia rivers to the mouth of the Snake. This proposed road will traverse the rich Columbia valley, where at present there are no railway facilities. It will secure its power from the Priest Rapids, where it will be generated more than enough electricity to operate the entire line. From Trinidad to the mouth of the Yakima the country is sparsely settled as yet."
