SKAGGS IS STILL ALIVE

LOCAL EAGLES MISINFORMED ABOUT FATAL EXPLOSION.

Snake River Mine Explosion Only Inflicted Temporary Injuries That Grande Friends—Is Now Working Again.

Though reported killed by an explosion near Burt, Idaho, while working in the Snake River mines, Charles Skaggs is alive and working today. Three weeks ago local members of the Eagles' lodge received news that Skaggs had been instantly killed in a mine explosion. Yesterday B. F. Wade of this city, received a letter from the dead, so to speak, but perusal of the epistle revealed the fact that the writer was still on earth.

It appears that when the explosion occurred, Skaggs received injuries that forced him to the hospital for three weeks, but at no time was there any indication of fatality. Skaggs is now working in the hotel at Burt, and asks that his premature obituary be retracted. His friends here will be delighted to know that the "untimely death" was not a fact.

ARGUE BANK QUESTION

Pendleton, Nov. 4.—An echo of the Scriber bank failure at La Grande was heard this morning in the supreme court when J. D. Slater, representing the defunct bank and its cashier, and Leroy Lomax of Portland, representing the respondent, S. S. Booth of La Grande, argued the appeal from the district court of that district from a verdict given Booth on an action for an accounting brought by him a couple of years ago.

Booth had deposited certain sums with Scriber and his bank and although a portion of the amount was returned to him the account was kept open and never fully satisfied. According to Mr. Lomax, in the original trial of the case, it developed that certain certificates of deposit left with the bank by Booth had been fraudulently endorsed by Scriber, and the money used by him, but little attention was paid to the matter at the time.

FINDS ROUTE IS FEASIBLE.

Pendleton Man Returns From Trip Over Oregon Trunk Line Survey.

W. F. Nelson, promoter of the proposed Oregon Trunk line, for which surveys are now being made, and J. J. Martin, president of the Oregon Valley Land company, owners of the Oregon military road grant, returned last night from a three weeks' trip through central Oregon, says the Pendleton Tribune. Mr. Nelson continued south from Lakeview through the Pitt river valley in northern California, and down the Sacramento valley to San Francisco. He was looking over the ground for the trunk line and found the route a feasible one, with low grades and short r miles even than the present Oregon and California route of the Southern Pacific.

From Bend to Silver Lake the par-

ty found an excellent route for the line, crossing the Pauline mountains on a 500-foot ridge. The highest point on the line would be only 4900 feet high, with a 200-mile stretch on either side to reach it.

Four or five surveying parties are in the Pitt river valley at present, surveying a line for the Southern-Pacific to run up the valley and then turn northeast to Ontario, on the main line of the O. R. & N.

According to Mr. Martin, from 6000 to 10,000 people will have moved into Lake county by this time next year. "Enough cattle were shipped out of Lake county last year," said Mr. Martin, "to support 20,000 head of stock in the county about \$240."

INTEREST IS GROWING

Ontario, Ore., Nov. 4.—Considerable excitement prevails in Ontario and vicinity on account of the fact that a seam of oil is continually visible on the water coming from the deep well now being drilled here. Drilling was begun some three weeks ago, and the well is now down about 400 feet. Some delay was experienced for 10 days or more by reason of a break in the casing when the well was down about 130 feet. The difficulty was overcome a few days ago, however, and the drill is now progressing at the rate of about 75 feet a day.

One thing has already been established, and that is that the shale here carries oil. That means that if a sand is found below the shale oil will be found in great quantities, as a sand bed is necessary to retain the oil which flows in the shale. It is now considered without question that there is oil in this vicinity; whether it is directly beneath the drill now in operation is, of course, a matter of speculation, but the drillers, who are experienced men from the California and Pennsylvania fields, feel very much encouraged. They say the shale is more oily than any they ever worked in, and that the indications are very good.

A considerable pressure of gas has been encountered. The careless lighting of a match near the well a few days ago resulted in an explosion which burned several bystanders, and demonstrates that the well may be expected to yield a strong flow of gas, even if the oil is not forthcoming. Postmaster Spool was one of the men who suffered from the explosion, his right ear being severely lured. The presence of gas in this vicinity has long been a matter of certainty. A. F. Boyer has for seven years heated and lighted his dwelling with gas piped from a deep well drilled on his land. It will now be a matter of but a short time until some definite knowledge is gained concerning what lies beneath the oil shale now being pierced.
