# ANKENY, OF WASHINGTON AND MARSHALL FIELD'S MILLION-DOLLAR DEAL WITH HIM

There is a very interesting two-page article on "Ankeny of Washington" in a current number of "Leslie's Weekly" of New York, quite different in tone from the bitter political attacks which appear in a recent Collier's. The writer in Leslie strikes the real keynote of Ankeny's character in his statement, "You can get any kind of an Ankeny you come to Walla Walla prepared to find," and he found the pioneer, banker, neighbor and friend rather than the astute and "wicked" politician of his brother correspondent.

Levi Ankeny came from Missouri to the coast in a prairie schooner in 1850, and in 1860, at 10 years, was carrying express from Eugene to Portland, Ore. He opened a general store in Lewiston, Idaho, which gradually developed into a sort of a bank, the miners insisting that the young merchant should take care of their dust, of which he often had large amounts on deposit.

Removing to Walla Walla, he organized the First National bank in

1878, and is now a director in seven prosperous national banks and the president of four of them.

Among Senator Ankeny's interesting reminiscences of earlier days one especially deserves mention, and that is the early eighties, when the First National bank was not as big as it is now, I pretty nearly had my breath taken away one day by a good-looking stranger hailing from Chicago. He threw a letter of credit for \$50,000 from a Chicago bank on my desk and quietly said: "Can you cash that?" I looked him over once or twice, made a quick estimate of all the loose cash I thought we could scrape up and said, "Yes, how do you want it?" He gave a smile, sat down and said, "I think I'll take it in land." In a month's time, as his authorized agent, I bought about 20,000 acres of cheap railroad land for my Chicago friend, taking the deeds in my name at his request, paying an average of \$2.65 an acre. He cleared over a million dollars on this one deal in a few years, and his name was Marshall Field."

Seldom, if ever, has a football game been more taxing to the players than was the strenuous practice which the first team was put through last evening in preparation for the Pendleton game next Saturday afternoon. Coaches Wall and Mickelson, assisted by Ralph Reynolds and Ben Grout, gave the regulars such a lesson as will stand them well in hand when the heavy players from the Wheat Town faces them on the local gridiron Saturday. From 3:30 until 5:30, the coaches labored strenuously with intricate plays, and when darkness drove the players to the dressing room, the trainers felt they had done much good to the team. It is such training that gives the proper endurance, and though some of the new men in the squad cannot as yet solve the reason why practice should be so stiff, they will know the reason when the heavy beaves of the Pendleton aggregation has been pounding away at the little line of local high school boys next Saturday for a period of a half hour or more.

No game of the season will attract as much interest as the Saturday affair. Never in years have chances been so favorable for the La Grande team to meet the Pendleton artists on a quality as right now. It is evident that rooters will have chances enough to feel that thrilling sensation sent through the loyal football enthusiasts when his favorite player makes a sensational play.

Scrimmage work tonight, and light signal practice tomorrow night is the slate for the local practice grounds.

## OPEN NORTH BANK FRIDAY

Next Friday morning the North Bank railroad will be officially opened to traffic, says a Portland paper. The occasion will be made of more than ordinary interest by the presence of J. J. Hill, chairman of the board of directors, and Louis W. Hill, president of the Great Northern, who will arrive in the city Friday morning. They will be accompanied by Howard Elliott, president of the Northern Pacific system, and will remain until midnight of November 6, when their special will be taken north over the new road.

As soon as word of this visit was received today by Secretary E. C. Giltner of the Chamber of Commerce, he began preparations for the entertainment of the distinguished guests. This is not yet decided upon, except that a banquet will be tendered at the Commercial club the evening of November 6. It will be given under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce and its entertainment committee, of which General C. F. Beebe is chairman. It will be by invitation and the price of tickets will be announced at a later date, as well as the list of speakers. President Hill and President Elliott will be given prominent places on the program.

Upon the arrival of the railroad kings they will be met by a reception committee headed by President C. F. Swigert, of the Chamber of Commerce who will preside at the banquet. During the day they will be entertained at a luncheon and by an auto trip. It is possible that the committee in charge of the affair will not attempt to arrange any outdoor ceremony at the terminal depot.

President Francis B. Clarke of the North Bank road, will meet the Hill party at Spokane Thursday morning. They will visit Astoria and remain there over Thursday night.
